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a/ Reporting of military expenditure by force groups and expenditure items is carried out in accordance with the schedule adopted in the USSR for the armed forces and the classification of income and expenditure in the USSR budget and the budgets of the Union Republics.

Since strategic forces do not have a clearly designated structure, falling as they do within various branches of the armed forces, there are no figures in column 1.

Column 2 gives the figures for land forces, and column 3 those for naval forces. Column 4 indicates air forces and column 5 strategic missile forces, anti-aircraft defence forces and other armed forces which are not part of the land, naval and air forces.

b/ Column 6 gives the figures for central support for the armed forces as a whole, and column 7 those for command, including the main and central administrative departments of the USSR Ministry of Defence and support units.

c/ Column 8 gives the figures for paramilitary forces, which are not part of the USSR armed forces; these figures are submitted by the frontier troops of the USSR State Security Committee, the territorial troops of the USSR Ministry of the Interior and the instruction centres of the All-Union Voluntary Society for co-operation with the Army, Navy and Air Force (DOSAAF) for training conscripts for service in the armed forces.

d/ Column 10 gives the figures for non-reimbursable military assistance to foreign countries.

e/ Column 14 gives the figures for maintaining the civil-defence headquarters staff at the Republic, *krai* (territorial), and *oblast* (regional) level. Expenditure for the maintenance of civil-defence depots, bases and military units which form part of military districts are included in the category of maintenance of land forces (column 2); no breakdown of these figures seems feasible.

f/ Row 1.1 gives the figures for all types of payments to personnel (daily subsistence, pay and other remuneration for military and civilian personnel). This row in column 12 gives the figures for pensions paid to military personnel.

g/ Row 1.2.2 gives the figures for repair and maintenance of weapons and military technology, and also of equipment and facilities.

h/ Row 2.1.3 in column 12 gives the figures for the expenditure of the USSR Ministry of Atomic Energy and Industry in connection with defence.
