Report of the Regional Workshop for Central Asian States Parties to the Biological Weapons Convention on scientific and practical implementation issues (Almaty, Kazakhstan, 23-24 October 2018)

Submitted by Kazakhstan, co-sponsored by Germany

I. Introduction

1. From 23 to 24 October 2018, the governments of Kazakhstan and the Federal Republic of Germany and the Biological Weapons Convention (BWC) Implementation Support Unit (ISU) co-organized a regional workshop for Central Asian States Parties to the BWC on scientific and practical implementation issues. The event was held at the Central Reference Laboratory at the Masgut Aikimbayev Kazakh Scientific Center for Quarantine and Zoonotic Diseases in Almaty, Kazakhstan.

2. The activity brought together thirty participants from five BWC States Parties (Germany, Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan, Tajikistan, and Uzbekistan), three regional and international organizations (International Science and Technology Center, Group of Experts/Security Council Committee established pursuant to resolution 1540 (2004), Organization for Security and Co-operation in Europe), and one non-governmental organization (Verification Research, Training and Information Centre). While the venue was provided by the government of Kazakhstan, the German Federal Foreign Office provided funding for travel and accommodation for sponsored participants.

3. The two-day workshop served as a platform for dialogue on the implementation of the Convention. The event helped to share information regarding national implementation approaches and best practices among the participants in an interactive manner and also explored opportunities for cooperation and assistance among the States Parties as well as with relevant international and regional organizations.

II. Workshop Proceedings

4. The activity was opened by representatives of the workshop co-organizers. Mr. Yerzhan Ashikbayev, Deputy Minister of Foreign Affairs of the Republic of Kazakhstan, welcomed participants on behalf of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of the Republic of Kazakhstan, Consul General Jörn Rosenberg spoke on behalf of the German Federal





Foreign Office, and Dr. Alex Lampalzer, Deputy Chief of the BWC ISU made opening remarks on behalf of the United Nations Office for Disarmament Affairs.

- 5. The Regional Workshop consisted of four main sessions:

- iii. Synergies between the implementation of UNSCR 1540 and the BWC;
- iv. Confidence Building Measures under the BWC;
- v. Best Practices of CBMs;
- vi. Initiatives to enhance transparency and build confidence; national legislation);
- vii. National legislation;

(d) Cooperation and Assistance

- i. Opportunities for cooperation and assistance;
- ii. Opportunities for bilateral discussions between Central Asian experts and representatives of regional/international organizations;

(e) The Way Ahead

In addition, Kazakh authorities provided a guided tour of the Central Reference Laboratory/M. Aikimbayev Kazakh Scientific Center for Quarantine and Zoonotic Diseases and shared information about its activities.

III. Workshop summary and conclusions

6. Participants expressed their appreciation to the governments of Kazakhstan and Germany as well as the BWC ISU for the well-organized workshop. They noted the great benefit of the two-day activity for the purpose of regional cooperation and also commended the government of Kazakhstan for the opportunity to receive a guided tour through the premises of the Central Reference Laboratory. Various participants noted that the workshop objectives were met and that the proceedings were carried out in a very constructive, open and all-inclusive manner.


7. Workshop participants stressed the importance of the Convention as one of the fundamental pillars of the multilateral disarmament regime and underlined their States Parties' full commitment to implementing its provisions. Many of the discussions centered on efforts to further enhance the domestic implementation of the Convention, including by further amending or revising existing national legislation. In this context, some experts noted the need for international technical assistance to develop the required regulatory frameworks for the full and effective implementation of the Convention.

8. Furthermore, several representatives expressed the value of bilateral, regional and international cooperation opportunities and welcomed further efforts in this regard. Some experts particularly highlighted the need for deepened cooperation among Central Asian States Parties and joint research and scientific, technical and educational projects. In this context, Kazakhstan expressed its principle readiness to host future regional training events at the Central Reference Laboratory in Almaty.

9. In view of rapid scientific and technical developments with potential relevance to the goals and objectives of the Convention, some experts underlined the benefit of establishing a scientific advisory mechanism under the Convention. Similarly, some participants acknowledged the potential value of voluntary codes of conduct for life scientists, which are again being discussed by States Parties in the current intersessional programme.

10. In the course of the workshop, several participants also recognized the threat posed by the deliberate use of biological agents, particularly from non-state actors. In the same vein, a number of experts underlined the crucial importance for preparedness and mitigation measures to address natural disease outbreaks in the region. In this context, some representatives emphasized the need for close coordination and cooperation among States Parties in response to bio-events and noted the benefits of mobile bio-medical units.
