REPORT OF THE MEETING OF THE STATES PARTIES

- 1. The Meeting of the States Parties to the Convention on Prohibitions or Restrictions on the Use of Certain Conventional Weapons Which May be Deemed to be Excessively Injurious or to Have Indiscriminate Effects (CCW) held at Geneva on 27 and 28 November 2003 decided, as contained in paragraph 29 of its Report (CCW/MSP/2003/3), "to commission follow-up work under the oversight of the Chairman-designate of a Meeting of the States Parties to the Convention to be held on 18 and 19 November 2004 at Geneva in conjunction with the Sixth Annual Conference of the States Parties to Amended Protocol II." For that purpose the Meeting of the States Parties to the Convention decided that the Group of Governmental Experts would continue its work in the year 2004.
- 2. The Meeting of the States Parties decided, as contained in paragraph 26 of CCW/MSP/2003/3, that the Working Group on Explosive Remnants of War would continue its work in the year 2004 with the following mandate:
 - "To continue to consider the implementation of existing principles of International Humanitarian Law and to further study, on an open-ended basis, and initially with particular emphasis on meetings of military and technical experts, possible preventive measures aimed at improving the design of certain specific types of munitions, including sub-munitions, with a view to minimise the humanitarian risk of these munitions becoming explosive remnants of war. Exchange of information, assistance and co-operation would be part of this work."
- 3. The Meeting of the States Parties decided, as contained in paragraph 27 of CCW/MSP/2003/3, that the Working Group on Mines Other Than Anti-Personnel Mines would continue its work in the year 2004 with the following mandate:
 - "1. To consider all proposals on Mines Other Than Anti-Personnel Mines put forward since the establishment of the Group of Governmental Experts with the aim of elaborating appropriate recommendations on Mines Other Than Anti-Personnel Mines for submission to the next Meeting of the States Parties to the Convention.
 - 2. Meetings of military experts shall also be conducted to provide advice on these activities."

- 4. The Meeting of the States Parties decided, as contained in paragraph 28 of CCW/MSP/2003/3, that "the Chairman-designate shall undertake consultations during the intersessional period on possible options to promote compliance with the Convention and its annexed Protocols, taking into account proposals put forward, and shall submit a report, adopted by consensus, to the States Parties."
- 5. The Meeting of the States Parties decided, as contained in paragraph 32 of CCW/MSP/2003/3, "to designate Ambassador Gordan Markotić of Croatia as Chairman of the Meeting of the States Parties to be held in 2004". Furthermore, the States Parties decided to appoint Ambassador Markku Reimaa of Finland as Coordinator on Mines Other Than Anti-Personnel Mines, and Ambassador Jayant Prasad of India as Coordinator on Explosive Remnants of War.
- 6. The Group of Governmental Experts held three sessions during 2004. The deliberations and activities of all three sessions of the Group are reflected in CCW/GGE/VII/3 of 23 March 2004, CCW/GGE/VIII/3 of 18 August 2004 and CCW/GGE/IX/2 of 18 November 2004, respectively.
- 7. The Meeting of the States Parties to the Convention was held at Geneva on 18 and 19 November 2004.
- 8. The following States Parties to the Convention participated in the work of the Group: Albania, Argentina, Australia, Austria, Bangladesh, Belarus, Belgium, Bolivia, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Brazil, Bulgaria, Burkina Faso, Canada, Chile, China, Colombia, Costa Rica, Croatia, Cuba, Cyprus, Czech Republic, Denmark, Estonia, Finland, France, Germany, Greece, Guatemala, Holy See, Honduras, Hungary, India, Ireland, Israel, Italy, Japan, Jordan, Latvia, Lithuania, Luxembourg, Malta, Mexico, Mongolia, Morocco, Netherlands, New Zealand, Nicaragua, Norway, Pakistan, Peru, Philippines, Poland, Portugal, Republic of Korea, Romania, Russian Federation, Senegal, Serbia and Montenegro, Slovakia, Slovenia, South Africa, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, The former Yugoslav Republic of Macedonia, Tunisia, Ukraine, United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland and United States of America.
- 9. The following State, which has deposited its instrument of ratification, acceptance, approval of or accession to the Convention, but for which it has not yet entered into force, also participated in the work of the Meeting: Sri Lanka.
- 10. The following Signatory States to the Convention also participated in the work of the Group: Afghanistan, Egypt, Iceland, Nigeria, Turkey and Vietnam.
- 11. The following States which are not parties to the Convention participated as observers: Algeria, Azerbaijan, Côte d'Ivoire, Kazakhstan, Kuwait, Lebanon, Madagascar, Malaysia, Nepal, Oman, Qatar, Saudi Arabia, Singapore, Syria, Thailand, Venezuela and Yemen.
- 12. The representative of the United Nations Mine Action Service (UNMAS) took part in the work of the Group.

- 13. The representatives of the following organisations also took part in the work of the Group: African, Caribbean and Pacific Group of States (ACP Group), European Commission, International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC), Geneva International Centre for Humanitarian Demining (GICHD), American Bar Association, Actiongroup Landmine.de, Handicap International, Human Rights Watch, International Campaign to Ban Landmines (ICBL), Landmine Action UK, Mines Action Canada and Pax Christi Netherlands.
- 14. The Meeting of the States Parties was opened on 18 November 2004 by the Deputy Secretary-General of the Conference on Disarmament and Director of the Department for Disarmament Affairs, Geneva Branch, Mr. Enrique Román-Morey.
- 15. The Meeting of the States Parties held three plenary meetings. At its first plenary meeting, on 18 November 2004, the Meeting of the States Parties confirmed by acclamation the nomination of Ambassador Gordan Markotić of Croatia as Chairperson of the Meeting.
- 16. At the same plenary meeting, the Meeting of the States Parties adopted its agenda as contained in Annex I.
- 17. At the same plenary meeting, the Meeting of the States Parties adopted the Rules of Procedure as adopted and used by the Second Review Conference (CCW/CONF.II/PC.1/1 with oral amendments).
- 18. At the same plenary meeting, the Meeting of the States Parties unanimously confirmed the nomination of Mr. Peter Kolarov, Political Affairs Officer, Department for Disarmament Affairs, Geneva Branch, as Secretary-General of the Meeting. He was assisted by Mr. Bantan Nugroho, Political Affairs Officer, as Secretary of the Meeting.
- 19. At the same plenary meeting, the Meeting of the States Parties agreed in the context of the short duration of the Meeting to have a streamlined bureau consisting of the Chairperson, the Group Coordinators (the representatives of China, Germany, Romania and South Africa), the Working Group Coordinators (Ambassador Jayant Prasad of India as Coordinator on Explosive Remnants of War and Ambassador Markku Reimaa of Finland as Coordinator on Mines Other Than Anti-Personnel Mines) and the Chairpersons of the Meetings of the Military Experts (Lt. Col. Bernard Jeanty of Switzerland on Explosive Remnants of War and Maj. Gen. Ahti Vartiainen of Finland on Mines Other Than Anti-Personnel Mines) on the understanding that this does not constitute a precedent for future meetings of the States Parties.
- 20. At the same plenary meeting, the Meeting of the States Parties received a message from the Secretary-General of the United Nations, which was delivered by the Deputy Secretary-General of the Conference on Disarmament and Director of the Department for Disarmament Affairs, Geneva Branch, Mr. Enrique Román-Morey.
- 21. At the same plenary meeting, the Meeting of the States Parties considered the financial arrangements for the Meeting, agreed by the 2003 Meeting of the States Parties to the Convention, as contained in Annex III of its Report (CCW/MSP/2003/3).

- 22. At the same plenary meeting, the Chairperson of the Meeting of the States Parties, Ambassador Gordan Markotić of Croatia, reported the work of the Group of Governmental Experts to the Meeting of the States Parties for its consideration.
- 23. The following States participated in the consideration of the report of the work of the Group of Governmental Experts and general exchange of views: Australia, Argentina, Belarus, Canada, China, Colombia, Croatia, Cuba, Denmark, France, Ireland, Israel, Japan, Mexico, Morocco, Netherlands (on behalf of the European Union), New Zealand, Norway, Pakistan, Poland, Republic of Korea, Russian Federation, South Africa, Switzerland and United States of America. The representative of the International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC) also participated in the discussion.
- 24. The following States participated in the discussion on the issue of the Third Review Conference of the States Parties to the Convention on Prohibitions or Restrictions on the Use of Certain Conventional Weapons Which May be Deemed to be Excessively Injurious or to Have Indiscriminate Effects: Japan, Netherlands (on behalf of the European Union) and South Africa.
- 25. Following the recommendations of the Group of Governmental Experts, the Meeting of the States Parties decided that the Working Group on Explosive Remnants of War would continue its work in the year 2005 with the mandate contained in Annex I of CCW/GGE/IX/2 as follows:
 - "To continue to consider, including through participation of legal experts, the implementation of existing principles of International Humanitarian Law and to further study, on an openended basis, with particular emphasis on meetings of military and technical experts, possible preventive measures aimed at improving the design of certain specific types of munitions, including sub-munitions, with a view to minimising the humanitarian risk of these munitions becoming explosive remnants of war. Exchange of information, assistance and co-operation would be part of this work. The Group will report on the work done to the next Meeting of the States Parties."
- 26. Following the recommendations of the Group of Governmental Experts, the Meeting of the States Parties decided that the Working Group on Mines Other Than Anti-Personnel Mines would continue its work in the year 2005 with the mandate contained in Annex II of CCW/GGE/IX/2 as follows:
 - "1. To consider all proposals on Mines Other Than Anti-Personnel Mines put forward since the establishment of the Group of Governmental Experts with the aim of elaborating appropriate recommendations on Mines Other Than Anti-Personnel Mines for submission to the next Meeting of the States Parties to the Convention.
 - 2. Meetings of military experts shall also be conducted to provide advice on these activities."

- 27. Following the recommendations of the Group of Governmental Experts, as contained in paragraph 25 of CCW/GGE/IX/2, the Meeting of the States Parties decided that the Chairperson-designate shall undertake consultations during the intersessional period on possible options to promote compliance with the Convention and its annexed Protocols, taking into account proposals put forward, and shall submit a report, adopted by consensus, to the States Parties.
- 28. The Meeting of the States Parties decided that the Chairperson-designate shall undertake consultations during the intersessional period on the preparation of the Third Review Conference of the States Parties to the Convention and shall report to the next Meeting of the States Parties.
- 29. Following the recommendations of the Group of Governmental Experts, as contained in paragraph 27 of CCW/GGE/IX/2, the Meeting of the States Parties decided to commission follow-up work under the oversight of the Chairperson-designate of a Meeting of the States Parties to the Convention to be held on 24 and 25 November 2005 at Geneva in conjunction with the Seventh Annual Conference of the States Parties to Amended Protocol II.
- 30. Following the recommendations of the Group of Governmental Experts, as contained in paragraph 26 of CCW/GGE/IX/2, the Meeting of the States Parties decided that the intersessional work of the Group of Governmental Experts of up to five weeks will be undertaken in three sessions at Geneva during 2005:
 - 7 to 11 March 2005
 - 2 to 12 August 2005
 - 14 to 22 November 2005
- 31. The Meeting of the States Parties addressed the issue of the dates and duration of the Seventh Annual Conference of the States Parties to Amended Protocol II and decided that it be held on 23 November 2005 at Geneva.
- 32. The Meeting of the States Parties decided to re-designate Ambassador Gordan Markotić of Croatia as Chairperson of the Meeting of the States Parties to be held in 2005, and reappointed Ambassador Jayant Prasad of India as Coordinator on Explosive Remnants of War and Ambassador Markku Reimaa of Finland as Coordinator on Mines Other Than Anti-Personnel Mines.
- 33. The proceedings of the Meeting of the States Parties as well as all the statements made during the discussions are reflected in the summary records of the Meeting of the States Parties which will be issued at a later date.
- 34. At its final plenary meeting, on 19 November 2004, the Meeting of the States Parties adopted its report, as contained in document CCW/MSP/2004/CRP.1, as orally amended, which is being issued as document CCW/MSP/2004/2 and the cost estimates of the three sessions in 2005 of the Group of Governmental Experts and of the Meeting of the States Parties to the Convention to be held in 2005.

ESTIMATED COSTS OF THE 2005 MEETING OF THE STATES PARTIES TO THE CONVENTION ON CERTAIN CONVENTIONAL WEAPONS

Note by the Secretariat

- 1. The Meeting of the States Parties to the Convention on Prohibitions or Restrictions on the Use of Certain Conventional Weapons Which May Be Deemed To Be Excessively Injurious or To Have Indiscriminate Effects, held in Geneva on 18 and 19 November 2004, decided to convene a Meeting of the States Parties on 24 and 25 November 2005.
- 2. This document is submitted pursuant to the above-mentioned decision of the States Parties and provides estimated costs in the amount of US\$299,800 for convening that meeting. A breakdown of these costs is provided in the attached table.
- 3. It should be noted that the costs are estimated on the basis of past experience and anticipated workload. The actual costs will be determined after the closure of the meeting and completion of related work, with all relevant expenditures recorded in the accounts. At that time, any adjustments in contributions by the participants sharing the costs will be determined accordingly.
- 4. With regard to the financial arrangements, it will be recalled that, in accordance with the practice followed on the occasion of previous multilateral disarmament conferences and related meetings, and as reflected in their Rules of Procedure, the costs are shared among the States Parties participating in the conferences, based upon the United Nations scale of assessment pro-rated to take into account the number of States Parties participating in the meetings. States that are not States Parties but that have accepted the invitation to take part in the meetings share in the costs to the extent of their respective rates of assessment under the United Nations scale of assessments.
- 5. Subject to the States Parties' approval of the estimated costs and cost-sharing formula, assessment notices will be prepared based on the overall estimated costs and applicable cost-sharing formula. Since the above-mentioned activities shall have no financial implication for the regular budget of the Organization, States Parties should proceed with the payment of their share of the estimated costs as soon as assessment notices have been received.

ESTIMATED COSTS OF THE THREE SESSIONS IN 2005 OF THE GROUP OF GOVERNMENTAL EXPERTS OF THE STATES PARTIES TO THE CONVENTION ON CERTAIN CONVENTIONAL WEAPONS

Note by the Secretariat

- 1. The Meeting of the States Parties to the Convention on the Prohibitions or Restrictions on the Use of Certain Conventional Weapons Which May Be Deemed to Be Excessively Injurious or to have Indiscriminate Effects, held in Geneva on 18 and 19 November 2004, decided that the open-ended Group of Governmental Experts to examine a number of proposals submitted by various States Parties should continue its deliberations in the year 2005 and will meet for three sessions as follows: 10th session from 7 to 11 March 2005, 11th session from 2 to 12 August 2005 and 12th session from 14 to 22 November 2005.
- 2. This document is submitted pursuant to the above-mentioned decision of the States Parties and provides the estimated costs of those sessions.
- 3. The costs of the sessions are estimated at US\$1,137,400. A breakdown of the estimated costs is provided in the attached tables.
- 4. It should be noted that the costs are estimated on the basis of past experience and anticipated workload. The actual costs will be determined after the closure of the sessions and completion of related work, with all relevant expenditures recorded in the accounts. At that time, any adjustments in contributions by the participants sharing the costs will be determined accordingly.
- 5. With regard to the financial arrangements, it will be recalled that in accordance with the practice followed on the occasion of previous multilateral disarmament conferences, and as reflected in their Rules of Procedure, the costs of such conferences, including those pertaining to preparatory meetings, would be shared among the States Parties participating in the conferences, based upon the United Nations scale of assessment pro-rated to take into account the number of States Parties participating in the conference. States that are not States Parties but that have accepted the invitation to take part in the meeting would share in the costs to the extent of their respective rates of assessment under the United Nations scale of assessments.
- 6. Subject to the States Parties' approval of the estimated costs and cost-sharing formula, assessment notices will be prepared based on the overall estimated costs and applicable cost-sharing formula. Since the above-mentioned activities shall have no financial implication for the regular budget of the Organization, States Parties should proceed with the payment of their share of the estimated costs as soon as assessment notices have been received.
