## Technical assistance activities and budgetary and financial questions

## Note by the Secretariat

- 1. By its resolution 55/25 of 15 November 2000, the General Assembly decided that, until the Conference of the Parties to the Convention established pursuant to the United Nations Convention against Transnational Organized Crime decided otherwise, an account would be operated within the United Nations Crime Prevention and Criminal Justice Fund for the provision to developing countries and countries with economies in transition of the technical assistance that they might require for implementation of the Convention and the Protocols thereto, including for the preparatory measures needed for that implementation.
- 2. In order to comply with General Assembly resolution 55/25, a sub-account was opened within the United Nations Crime Prevention and Criminal Justice Fund for the provision of the above-mentioned activities.
- 3. At its second session, held in Vienna from 10 to 21 October 2005, the Conference of the Parties to the United Nations Convention against Transnational Organized Crime adopted decision 2/6, in which it decided to establish an open-ended interim working group to advise and assist it in the implementation of its mandate on technical assistance. In the same decision, the Conference of the Parties decided that the working group should meet during the third session of the Conference of the Parties and hold at least one intersessional meeting before the fourth session of the Conference of the Parties; and requested the secretariat to submit a report to the Conference of the Parties at its fourth session on its relevant technical assistance activities.

4. On the basis of guidance provided by the Conference of the Parties and its working group, the secretariat will develop budget proposals to address the needs identified for technical assistance. The budget proposals for approval by the Conference of the Parties will be designed on the basis of a comprehensive programme to which contributions could be channelled. Such a programme budget would include clearly defined sub-components to allow both flexibility and transparency in its funding, implementation and reporting.
