Organizational matters

In accordance with Executive Board decision 2006/14 and rule 7 of the rules of procedure of the Executive Board of UNDP, UNFPA and UNOPS, the Board will elect a new Bureau consisting of a President and four Vice-Presidents. The election will take place on 16 January 2017. According to the established pattern of rotation of posts among the various regional groups, the President of the Executive Board for 2017 should be elected from the Board members of the Western European and other States group.

Under this item, the Executive Board will adopt the agenda and agree on the workplan for the session as presented by the Secretary of the Board. The Board will also approve the report of its second regular session 2016. A draft report was distributed to Board members for their comments; the final report contains comments received by or before the deadline.

In accordance with decision 96/25, a workplan for 2017 was prepared by the secretariat in consultation with the Bureau of the Executive Board and is submitted to the Board for adoption.

**Item 3
Evaluation**

The Independent Evaluation Office of UNDP is carrying out an ‘Evaluation of UNDP contribution to anti-corruption and addressing drivers of corruption’, which is part of its medium-term plan (DP/2014/5) approved by the Executive Board in January 2014. The evaluation assesses UNDP contribution to anti-corruption and addressing drivers of corruption during the period 2008-2015, covering the period of the last strategic plan 2008-2013, and the current strategic plan 2014-2017. The evaluation finds that while specific anti-corruption initiatives were supported, UNDP has focused more on addressing drivers of corruption, particularly demand-side accountability. UNDP has developed a unique niche in supporting efforts to address corruption drivers and to strengthen national anti-corruption capacities. Simultaneously pursuing anti-corruption and accountability initiatives has enabled UNDP to work at multiple levels. The evaluation concludes that while UNDP contributions have been important for enhancing anti-corruption policies and capacities, their actual outcomes have been dependent on broader governance capacities. Evolving governance systems and processes and inadequate judicial capacities have reduced the impact of anti-corruption initiatives. In the absence of core public administration accountability processes and capacities, even strong anti-corruption enforcement institutions can do little to address corruption. The evaluation reaffirms that addressing governance, corruption and development linkages is critical for achieving development outcomes. The Board may wish to consider the conclusions and recommendations from the evaluation and request that UNDP take the evaluation recommendations into account in its future anti-corruption programming and accountability initiatives. The evaluation is accompanied by the management response.

The Independent Evaluation Office of UNDP is carrying out an ‘Evaluation of disability-inclusive development at UNDP’, which is part of its medium-term plan (DP/2014/5) approved by the Executive Board in January 2014. The evaluation assesses UNDP contribution to disability-inclusive development during the period 2008-2016, which corresponds to the current and past UNDP strategic plans, and to the period within which the United Nations Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (CRPD) has been in force. It assesses the following key aspects: (a) strategic relevance of disability-inclusive development for UNDP as observed through its strategic priorities; (b) UNDP global positioning and partnerships for disability-inclusive development, with particular focus on the role of UNDP as host of the United Nations Partnership on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (a collaborative inter-agency effort); (c) UNDP programme and project results: those that directly assist persons with disabilities, and those that ‘mainstream’ the inclusion of persons with disabilities; and (d) UNDP internal practices, including institutional culture, policies and procedures on the employment, accommodation and participation of persons with disabilities. Finally, the evaluation presents an analysis of disability-inclusive development in 18 similar organizations with a view to identifying good practices for UNDP to consider adapting as it promotes disability-inclusive development. The evaluation concludes that while initial steps have been taken to introduce the issue of disability-inclusive development, UNDP needs to make concerted efforts to update and deepen its substantive contribution and programming activities. The evaluation notes that UNDP does not track its

contributions in this area in a systematic manner, making assessment of its contribution quite difficult. The evaluation has taken a formative approach and presents recommendations that are pertinent to the indicators on disability-inclusive development that are integral to the Sustainable Development Goals. The Board may wish to consider the conclusions and recommendations from the evaluation and request that UNDP factor the recommendations into their future efforts in support of persons with disabilities. The evaluation is accompanied by the management response.
