## Non-governmental organizations

### Report of the Committee on Non-Governmental Organizations on its 2022 regular session

(New York, 17–26 May and 7 June 2022)

#### *Summary*

At its 2022 regular session, held from 17 to 26 May and on 7 June 2022, the Committee on Non-Governmental Organizations had before it 586 applications for consultative status, including 320 applications deferred from earlier sessions. Of the non-governmental organizations submitting those applications, the Committee recommended 203 for consultative status, deferred 354 for further consideration at its resumed session in 2022 and closed without prejudice consideration of 28 applications of non-governmental organizations that had failed to respond to queries over two consecutive sessions of the Committee. It also had before it 690 quadrennial reports, of which it took note of 604. The Committee heard 13 representatives of non-governmental organizations.

The present report contains two draft decisions on matters calling for action by the Economic and Social Council.

By draft decision I, the Council would:

- (a) Grant special consultative status to 203 non-governmental organizations;
- (b) Note that the Committee decided to take note of 604 quadrennial reports submitted by non-governmental organizations, including new and deferred reports;
- (c) Close without prejudice consideration of the requests for consultative status made by 28 non-governmental organizations after the organizations had failed to respond to queries over the course of two consecutive sessions of the Committee;
- (d) Note that the Committee decided to take note of the request by one non-governmental organization to withdraw its application for consultative status.

By draft decision II, the Council would take note of the present report.

6. The representative of the Russian Federation referred to the question asked by the delegation of Estonia to the organization International Association for the Development of the Abaza-Abkhaz Ethnos "Alashara" about the alleged incorrect use of terminology. She stated that her delegation did not consider the question as a position of the Committee on Non-Governmental Organizations on the official status of the Republic of Abkhazia and that it did not affect the position of the Russian Federation on the recognition of the Republic of Abkhazia as a sovereign State.

7. The observer for Armenia stated that there had been unjustified deferrals of applications of certain Armenian NGOs. He noted that all three applications for consultative status by Armenian civil society organizations had been deferred during the current session by the Committee on the basis of questions posed by one delegation. He pointed out that the applications of the organizations "Mission Armenia" Charitable Non-Governmental Organization and Armenian Women for Health and Environment had been deferred during previous sessions of the Committee on the basis of questions by the same delegation. He maintained that the questions posed to the organization were not indicative of a genuine interest in knowing more about the organization. He recalled his delegation's position that the pattern of discriminatory and repetitive questioning and abuse of the working methods of the Committee had a negative impact on the organizations, as well as on the Committee, and reiterated the importance of the impartiality and objectivity of the application review process.

8. The representative of Türkiye underlined his delegation's strong support for the involvement and active participation of NGOs in the work of the United Nations. He stated that his delegation pursued an impartial and constructive approach in the evaluation of NGO applications for consultative status. He noted that the Committee's evaluation was based solely on the purposes and principles of the Charter of the United Nations and the requirements of Economic and Social Council resolution 1996/31, and stressed that there were no other criteria. He further stated that the approach was in accordance with the Committee's duty and responsibility to exercise diligence in carrying out its mandate. He noted that the questions posed on behalf of the Committee assisted in the evaluation of the applications of respective organizations. He highlighted that various Armenian organizations had been recommended for consultative status by the Committee in the past.

9. The representative of the United States of America expressed her delegation's strong support for the accreditation of the Syrian American Medical Society Foundation. She stated that the organization operated more than 100 medical facilities in the Syrian Arab Republic that provided general and specialized medical care for Syrians in need, despite the continuing violence. Citing examples of the organization's work in Aleppo and Khan Shaykhun, she stated that its work had helped millions of Syrians in need. She stressed that the organization's work was significant and meaningful and that it should be recommended for consultative status.

10. At its 13th meeting, on 26 May, the representative of the United States expressed her delegation's concern about some of the questions posed by the Committee, which, in her view, were often repetitive or represented a misuse of the criteria established

under Council resolution 1996/31 to challenge NGOs based on the nature of their work. She requested that the Committee take a vote on the applications of the following organizations: Inimõiguste Instituut, National Human Rights Civic Association “Belarusian Helsinki Committee”, Non C’è Pace Senza Giustizia, Syrian American Medical Society Foundation and Wikimedia Foundation, Inc.

11. The representative of India sought clarification regarding the request for a vote, noting that the Committee resorted to voting only when it was unable to reach a consensus. He stated that delegations required sufficient notice to make an objective assessment before proceeding to a vote. He indicated that his delegation required time to review the information on the organizations and to consult on the request for a vote. The representatives of Bahrain, Cuba, Nicaragua and Pakistan concurred with the representative of India that more time was needed to consult and to review the request for a vote. The representatives of Cuba and Pakistan also called for the information on the organizations concerned to be shared in writing.

12. The representative of the United States stated that proposals for action could be submitted to the Committee in either oral or written format. She clarified that her delegation had waited in good faith until the end of the consideration of the agenda item before requesting that the Committee vote on the organizations’ applications.

13. The representative of the Russian Federation stated that, as a subsidiary body of the Economic and Social Council, the Committee was obliged to follow the rules of procedure of the Council. He drew attention to rule 54 of the rules of procedure and asserted that the request made by the representative of the United States could not be discussed or put to a vote less than 24 hours after copies of the proposal had been circulated to all members. He therefore objected to the request for a vote.

14. The representative of China pointed out that some of the organizations on the list had not yet submitted their responses to the Committee’s questions and stated that the Committee should act responsibly and respect the organization’s right to respond.

15. The representative of Israel recalled that, based on the precedent of the Committee, any member of the Committee could request that it take a decision on an application for consultative status that was currently pending before it. He noted that, although the Committee made use of questions to obtain information from NGOs by consensus, it could decide on any request that was pending before it, including through a vote. In that regard, he stated that the request made by the representative of the United States was valid and legitimate. He noted that the members of the Committee had received in advance the lists of all those organizations whose applications were being considered. Committee members had therefore been afforded adequate time to review the information on the NGOs and to consult, as appropriate, during their preparations for the session.

16. The representative of Estonia concurred with the representative of Israel, noting that, based on precedent, the Committee could consider a proposal by any member under the existing procedural rules. Regarding the request for additional time to review the applications, she noted that the applications before the Committee had been examined repeatedly and in detail by Committee members and urged the Committee to proceed with the vote in fulfilment of its mandate.

17. The representative of China sought clarification from the Secretariat regarding the procedure followed by the Committee at its 2021 resumed session, when a list of organizations had been circulated in advance to the Committee before it had proceeded to a vote. The Secretariat clarified that, in that instance, the list of organizations circulated in advance to the Committee had related to a request for the withdrawal of the status of certain organizations, which was considered under agenda item 7.

18. At the request of the Chair, the representative of the United States clarified that her delegation's motion was a request for a vote under rule 59 of the rules of procedure of the Council. She reiterated her delegation's request for the Committee to vote on the applications of the five organizations mentioned, in line with its established procedures.

19. Given the views expressed, the general practice of the Committee and the very limited amount of time left in the current meeting – the last substantive meeting of the regular session – the Chair proposed that the consideration of the matter be postponed to the resumed session of the Committee in order to give delegations adequate time to consider the request. She asked that the list of organizations be circulated to all delegations.

20. The representative of the United States recalled her delegation's prerogative, on the basis of the rules of procedure and precedent, to request a vote and objected to the deferral of the matter.

21. The representative of the Russian Federation reiterated his delegation's objection to the motion on the basis of rule 54 of the rules of procedure of the Council and stated that the proposal had been presented as a draft decision to grant consultative status to the organizations concerned.

22. At the request of the Chair, the Secretariat clarified that the practice and precedent of the Committee allowed for any member of the Committee to request a vote by the Committee at any time and for the Committee to act upon that request.

23. Following additional statements made by various delegations, the Chair, noting that the time allocated to the meeting had been exhausted and that other work remained to be done by the Committee at that meeting, including consideration of the skeleton report on the session and closing remarks, reiterated her proposal to defer consideration of the matter to the resumed session of the Committee. The representative of China supported that proposal.

24. The representative of the United States enquired as to whether the Committee could defer the consideration of the matter to its 14th meeting, at which the Committee was scheduled to adopt its report on the session, on an exceptional basis and without establishing a precedent.

25. The Chair noted that there was no precedent for holding substantive discussions during the Committee's final meeting, which was reserved for the adoption of the report. She nevertheless proposed that the Committee could consider taking up the matter during its final meeting. It could then make concise, oral revisions of a technical or procedural nature to the report, in order to reflect the outcome of its decisions, or it could reflect its decisions in an addendum to the report, to be prepared and adopted at a later date. As an alternative, she stated that the Committee could also explore the feasibility of adding an additional meeting to its regular session.

26. The representative of the Russian Federation objected to the proposal, noting that the final meeting of the Committee was reserved for discussions on the content of the report on the session. He expressed his delegation's support for the proposal to defer consideration of the matter to the resumed session of the Committee.

27. Owing to the fact that the time allocated for the meeting had been exhausted, the Chair suspended the Committee's consideration of the matter.

#### **Applications closed without prejudice**

28. At its 13th meeting, on 26 May, the Committee decided to close without prejudice consideration of the applications of 28 NGOs that had not responded to the

Committee's questions despite three reminders sent to the organizations (see chap. I, draft decision I (c)).

### **Request by a non-governmental organization to withdraw its application**

29. At its 6th meeting on 19 May, the Committee decided to take note of the request of one organization to withdraw its application for consultative status (see chap. I, draft decision I (d)).

## **B. New applications for consultative status**

30. The Committee considered item 3 (b) of its agenda, New applications for consultative status and new requests for reclassification, at its 1st to 4th meetings, held on 17 and 18 May and at its 11th meeting, held on 24 May. The Committee considered a total of 266 new applications for consultative status.

### **New applications recommended**

31. Of the 266 organizations whose new applications had been received, the Committee recommended that the following 160 be granted special consultative status with the Council (see chap. I, draft decision I (a)):

33. At its 10th meeting on 23 May, the Committee considered agenda item 4 (a), Deferred quadrennial reports submitted by non-governmental organizations in consultative status. It had before it a memorandum by the Secretary-General containing a compilation of 80 quadrennial reports submitted by NGOs in general and special consultative status on their activities during the period 2008 to 2021, which had been deferred from previous sessions of the Committee (E/C.2/2022/CRP.2). The Committee took note of 4 of those reports (see chap. I, draft decision I (b)) and decided to defer consideration of following 76 reports:

34. At its 9th and 10th meetings, on 23 May, the Committee considered agenda item 4 (b), New quadrennial reports submitted by non-governmental organizations in consultative status. It had before it notes by the Secretary-General containing 610 new quadrennial reports for the period 2017–2020 (E/C.2/2022/CRP.5–39, [E/C.2/2022/2](#) and [E/C.2/2022/2/Add.1–5](#)). The Committee took note of the quadrennial reports of 600 organizations (see chap. I, draft decision I (b)) and decided to defer consideration of the reports of the following 10 organizations:

#### **IV. Strengthening of the Non-Governmental Organizations Branch of the Department of Economic and Social Affairs of the Secretariat**

35. At its 1st meeting, on 17 May, the Committee jointly considered the following agenda items: agenda item 5, Strengthening of the Non-Governmental Organizations Branch; agenda item 6, Review of the methods of work of the Committee: implementation of Council resolution 1996/31, including the process of accreditation of representatives of non-governmental organizations, and Council decision 1995/304; and agenda item 8, General voluntary trust fund in support of the United Nations Non-Governmental Organizations Informal Regional Network, and heard an oral report by the Secretariat.

36. The Director of the Office of Intergovernmental Support and Coordination for Sustainable Development stated that the devastating impacts of the coronavirus disease (COVID-19) pandemic had underscored the need for collective action and global solidarity to address the serious challenges currently confronting the world. She highlighted the important role of NGOs and civil society as proactive actors in pandemic response and recovery efforts and their contributions to development and humanitarian areas, as well as their ongoing advocacy for the implementation of the Sustainable Development Goals. She emphasized that their contributions were crucial to the efforts of the international community to accelerate the achievement of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, as part of inclusive multilateralism, and stressed that their participation should be promoted, strengthened and expanded at all levels. In that regard, she noted the important role of the Committee in facilitating the engagement of NGOs in the work of the United Nations, as envisioned in the Charter. She welcomed the Committee's discussions at its informal meetings, held on 27 and 28 April, on convening consultations with NGOs in consultative status, following up on the landmark consultations convened by the Committee in 2018, and noted that they would provide an important platform to exchange views on how to enhance the participation of NGOs in the Organization's work.

37. The Director emphasized the importance of implementing the good practices that had emerged during the pandemic. She noted that the use of digital platforms during the pandemic to facilitate the participation of NGOs in United Nations meetings and processes had resulted in greater access and participation by diverse NGOs around the world, including many that had been unable to participate in the past. She therefore welcomed the Committee's discussions with regard to incorporating a hybrid component into its interactive question-and-answer sessions with NGOs, with a view to facilitating the participation of NGOs that were unable to attend the Committee's meetings in New York.

38. She provided the Committee with an update on the efforts made by the Branch to provide support to NGOs. She further informed the Committee that the new, enhanced information and communications technology system to replace the electronic platforms used by the Branch was still undergoing testing and was scheduled to be rolled out by the end of the year. She pointed out that the Branch was facing severe resource constraints owing to the increase in the number of NGOs in consultative status, as well as in those applying for consultative status, and reiterated her prior appeal to the Committee and Member States for support in securing adequate resources to facilitate its work.

**V. Review of the methods of work of the Committee: implementation of Council resolution 1996/31, including the process of accreditation of representatives of non-governmental organizations, and Council decision 1995/304**

39. At its 1st meeting, on 17 May, as part of its consideration of agenda item 6, on the review of its methods of work, the Committee took a decision to establish a deadline of two business days (48 hours) before the beginning of each Committee session for the receipt of responses provided by NGOs to its questions, in order to afford the Committee adequate time to review and consider those responses. The deadline will be applied as from the Committee's 2023 sessions.

40. A mention of that deadline will be included in the final reminders sent by the Branch, before each formal session, to NGOs for whom consideration of their application was deferred. All NGOs having submitted new applications for consultative status and those with deferred applications before the Committee will be informed of the new deadline. The Secretariat will generate the final list of cases to be closed, while making sure all relevant answers are processed, by the deadline.

41. At its 10th meeting, on 23 May, the Committee took note of the requests submitted by the following 67 organizations in consultative status to be heard by the Council at its 2022 session, as contained in conference room paper E/C.2/2022/CRP.4:

## **VI. Consideration of special reports and complaints by Member States**

42. At its 1st meeting, on 17 May, the Committee considered agenda item 7, Special reports. The representative of Pakistan requested that the complaint submitted by Pakistan under agenda item 7 be deferred to a later date. The Committee decided to defer consideration of the matter.

## **VII. Organization of the session**

### **A. Opening and duration of the session**

43. The Committee on Non-Governmental Organizations held its 2022 regular session from 17 to 26 May and on 7 June. The Committee held 14 meetings.

44. The session was opened by the Vice-Chair of the 2022 session of the Committee.

45. The representative of Mexico noted the long-standing partnership between civil society and the United Nations and stressed the important role of civil society in advancing the ideals and objectives of the United Nations and in facilitating the implementation of solutions to global challenges. She stressed that the Committee's important role in recommending the granting of consultative status to NGOs was the first step towards creating stronger links between NGOs and the United Nations. She underscored the importance of incorporating diverse views and perspectives so as to enrich analysis and solutions and solve global challenges.

46. The representative welcomed the discussions by the Committee on its working methods, including with regard to the possibility of incorporating a hybrid component into its question-and-answer sessions so as to enable those NGOs that wished to do so to participate remotely without prejudice to in-person participation, in line with

the current practice of the Committee. While noting the concerns raised about digital gaps as a barrier to remote participation, she maintained that the inclusion of a hybrid option would enable many NGO representatives who were unable to attend the Committee's meetings in person, whether for financial or other reasons. She expressed the hope that the Committee would reach a consensus on finding a way to implement the proposal. She further affirmed her delegation's support for the proposal to convene consultations with NGOs in consultative status, in line with the Committee's mandate.

47. The representative of the United States emphasized the critical role of the Committee in elevating the voices of civil society in the United Nations and beyond, thereby enhancing the work of Member States. She noted the challenges faced by civil society organizations with regard to making their voices heard on critical issues at the United Nations during the pandemic. She stressed that, in its efforts towards achieving the "new normal", the United Nations should actively re-engage with civil society in innovative ways in order to ensure inclusivity. She welcomed the Secretariat's plans to restore NGO access to the United Nations Headquarters complex in line with pre-pandemic levels. She urged the Committee to reaffirm its commitment to ensuring transparent and fair NGO accreditation processes to facilitate civil society participation. She recalled the requirement, as set out in paragraph 61 (a) of Council resolution 1996/31, for the Committee to hold consultations with organizations in consultative status before each of its sessions. In that regard, she requested that the Committee make arrangements for consultations with NGOs prior to the resumed session of the Committee in August and to ensure that such consultations were scheduled prior to all sessions thereafter. She welcomed the Committee's discussions at its informal sessions with regard to starting negotiations on long-term modalities for regular consultations, in April and December, as had been proposed by her delegation.

48. Noting that the global pandemic had demonstrated the need for flexibility and innovation to ensure the participation of civil society in decision-making on policy, the representative urged the Committee to make use of technology to facilitate the participation of NGOs in its sessions. In that regard, she expressed her delegation's support for the incorporation of a hybrid option into the Committee's question-and-answer sessions, noting that it would benefit NGOs, in particular those in the global South, who might lack the means to travel to New York. She urged the Committee to demonstrate its willingness to hear their voices by considering the option without delay. She reaffirmed her delegation's commitment to working with the Committee and civil society to increase the accessibility and transparency of the Committee's work, including by amplifying civil society voices and pushing back against efforts to stifle them for politically motivated reasons.

49. The representative of Türkiye stated that civil society constituted one of the basic pillars of the modern globalized world and noted that it was the guarantor of a democratic, participatory world order, in which different perspectives and voices were recognized. He stressed that the active participation of NGOs in the work of the Council and its subsidiary bodies and in international conferences of the United Nations was key to ensuring the international community's success in achieving the goals it had set for itself. He stated that, in applying for consultative status with the United Nations, NGOs aimed to share their expertise and insight and ideas for addressing critical issues at the international level. He noted that having consultative status provided organizations with the opportunity to amplify the effectiveness of their work and to expand their knowledge and capacities in their specific areas of work. He welcomed the significant contributions of NGOs in consultative status with the Council and affirmed his delegation's support for the establishment of consultative relations with NGOs, in conformity with the spirit, purposes and

principles of the Charter and within the framework of Council resolution 1996/31. He further welcomed the increase in the number of applications for consultative status that had been submitted by NGOs, despite the challenges posed by the COVID-19 pandemic. He noted, however, that the growing number of applications was having an impact on the Committee's ability to implement its mandate in a timely, proper and diligent manner. He commended the Committee for the steps it had taken towards enhancing the transparency and efficiency of its work and addressing some issues related to its working methods, and he expressed the hope that those efforts would result in the efficient fulfilment of its mandate.

50. The representative of Estonia affirmed his delegation's strong support for the participation of civil society organizations in the work of the United Nations and for ensuring that their voices were heard within the United Nations system, noting that their views, experience and capacity were crucial to the fulfilment of the aims and objectives of the United Nations. He stated that his delegation shared the view of many States and NGOs that the Committee's accreditation process lacked transparency, objectivity and efficiency and maintained that the Committee could do better in terms of fulfilling its mandate. He further stated that the Committee's working methods should not lead to repetitive and unjustified delays in the consideration of applications or be used as an unsurmountable barrier. In that respect, he called upon the Committee to uphold the principles laid down in Council resolution 1996/31. He underscored the importance of interactions with NGOs as an essential and beneficial element of the Committee's work. In that regard, he supported the proposal that the Committee explore all options available to facilitate the participation of NGOs from different regions during its sessions, including through the use of digital tools, with a view to enhancing the Committee's interaction with NGOs that lacked the opportunity and resources to travel to New York.

51. The representative of Greece noted that the Committee's long-drawn-out processes in terms of screening NGO applications and adopting reports had prevented hundreds of NGOs from receiving consultative status and said that the time for meaningful reform was long overdue. He added that groundless deferrals and asymmetric practices, including duplicative questioning, especially with respect to NGOs working on human rights, undermined the reputation of the Committee and of the United Nations as a whole. He maintained that the Council had a responsibility to systematically review the decisions of the Committee and to reverse them when misjudgments were identified. He called upon the Committee to enhance both the in-person and remote participation of NGOs, on the basis of the lessons learned during the COVID-19 pandemic, in order to strengthen the representation of NGOs from all regions and affirmed his delegation's commitment to ensuring the highest level of inclusion for civil society.

52. The observer for Armenia reiterated his delegation's full support for the inclusive engagement of civil society organizations in the activities of the United Nations, as reflected in the position expressed by his delegation during the discussions on modalities for civil society participation in United Nations meetings. He stressed that the adoption of a whole-of-society approach and stronger cooperation between Member States and other relevant stakeholders, including women and youth organizations, were essential to addressing evolving global challenges. He underscored the importance of impartiality and objectivity in the application review process and stated that the Committee had a responsibility to uphold the values and principles of the United Nations with respect to dialogue with civil society. He recalled that Armenia had been elected as a member of the Committee for the period 2023–2026 and pledged his delegation's commitment to advancing inclusive and substantive NGO engagement in the activities of the United Nations.

53. The representative of the European Union, in its capacity as observer, also on behalf of Albania, Georgia, Liechtenstein, Monaco, Montenegro, North Macedonia, the Republic of Moldova and Ukraine, expressed his delegation's continuing concern about the backlog in the screening of applications, noting that it had led to delays in the granting of consultative status to many NGOs. He noted that those delays were the result of deferrals of applications caused by repetitive questioning, in some cases without any credible justification, and that NGOs working on human rights issues were disproportionately affected. He reiterated the position expressed by the representative of Greece that the Council had a responsibility to systematically review the decisions of the Committee and to reverse them when misjudgments were identified.

54. He further noted that the reduction in the number of grounds passes issued to NGOs in consultative status, owing to the COVID-19 pandemic, was no longer necessary and called for the restoration of full access by NGOs to United Nations premises. He welcomed the Secretariat's update with regard to ongoing efforts to restore the issuance of grounds passes for NGOs in consultative status to pre-pandemic levels.

55. The representative urged the Committee to convene consultations with NGOs on the functioning of the Committee and called upon the United Nations to provide additional resources to the Secretariat, including by upgrading its technological tools. He reiterated his delegation's call for the Committee to consider the possibility of allowing NGOs to participate remotely in its question-and-answer sessions so as to facilitate the participation of organizations from all regions of the world.

56. He expressed concern regarding the significant number of government-affiliated NGOs applying for consultative status. Noting the large number of new and deferred applications before the Committee, he stated that there was no justification to further delay consideration of applications that had been pending for a very long time. In that regard, he cited as examples the applications of the organizations Associazione Luca Coscioni per la Libertà di Ricerca Scientifica, Diakonia, the Inimõiguste Instituut, the International Dalit Solidarity Network and Non C'è Pace Senza Giustizia.

57. The observer for the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland underlined the important role of the Committee and the significance of civil society in the work of the United Nations. He noted that civil society contributed to enriching the Organization's information base and ensuring the impact of its work on the ground and affirmed his delegation's commitment to championing civil society participation at the United Nations. He expressed regret at the opposition to civil society engagement expressed by some Member States and at the politicization of the Committee. In that regard, he noted a worrying increase in reprisals against organizations engaging with the Committee and other forums. He highlighted the fact that his delegation had spearheaded a joint statement by 80 States, in the Third Committee, against such reprisals and had successfully opposed hostile attempts, to restrict NGO participation in United Nations meetings. Noting that NGOs often operated in challenging contexts where their work was blocked or restricted, he emphasized that the Committee should facilitate, not impede, their work.

58. He urged the Committee to fulfil its collective commitment to inclusive multilateralism by addressing the backlog of deferred applications fairly and transparently. He pointed out that three quarters of the applications that had been deferred by the Committee for eight or more sessions were from human rights organizations. He stated that applications by human rights organizations were more likely to be deferred than other organizations and called for an end to such biased practice. He recalled that the United Kingdom had been elected as a member of the Committee for the period 2023–2026 and pledged that his delegation would work

towards improving the working methods of the Committee by making it more transparent and less susceptible to arbitrary deferrals. He urged Committee members to fulfil the commitment made by the Secretary-General to inclusive multilateralism, by promoting a safe and welcoming space for civil society participation at the United Nations.

59. At its 14th meeting, on 7 June, the Committee discussed whether to resume its consideration of agenda item 3 (a), Applications for consultative status and requests for reclassification deferred from previous sessions of the Committee, in order to consider the request made by the representative of the United States to proceed with a recorded vote to recommend to the Council the granting of status to several organizations.

60. The representative of the Russian Federation objected to the resumption of consideration of the item and put forward a motion to adjourn debate, in accordance with rule 50 of the rules of procedure of the Council.

61. The motion to adjourn the debate under rule 50 of the rules of procedure was adopted by a roll-call vote of 9 to 6, with 1 abstention. Of the 19 members of the Committee, 15 were present and voting. The voting was as follows:

62. The representative of China spoke in favour of the motion. The representatives of Estonia and the United States spoke against the motion. More detailed information on those proceedings will be reflected in the addendum to the present report.

## **B. Attendance**

63. The session was attended by 18 members of the Committee. Observers for other States Members of the United Nations, observers for non-member States and representatives of organizations of the United Nations system and NGOs also attended. The list of participants will be issued in document [E/C.2/2022/INF/1](#).

64. At its 2022 regular session, the Committee heard 13 representatives of NGOs, who were given the opportunity to respond to questions raised by the Committee. The additional information provided by the representatives facilitated the debate and the work of the Committee in taking its decisions.

## **C. Election of officers**

65. At its 1st meeting, on 17 May, the Committee elected Mine Ozgul Bilman (Türkiye) as Vice-Chair of the Committee.

## D. Agenda

66. At its 1st meeting, on 17 May, the Committee adopted the provisional agenda of its 2022 regular and resumed sessions, as contained in document [E/C.2/2022/1/Rev.1](#). The agenda reads as follows:

2. Adoption of the agenda and other organizational matters.
3. Applications for consultative status with the Council and requests for reclassification received from non-governmental organizations:

  - (a) Process of accreditation of representatives of non-governmental organizations;
  - (b) Issues on the agenda of the informal working group;
  - (c) Other related matters.
7. Special reports.
8. General voluntary trust fund in support of the United Nations Non-Governmental Organizations Informal Regional Network.
9. Provisional agenda and documentation for the 2023 session of the Committee.
10. Adoption of the report of the Committee on its 2022 session.

## **VIII. Adoption of the report of the Committee on its 2022 regular session**

67. At its 13th meeting, on 26 May, the Committee took note of the draft report and authorized the Rapporteur to finalize the report with the support of the Secretariat and in consultation with the members of the Committee, as appropriate, with a view to its submission to the Economic and Social Council for appropriate action.
