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1. ASSOCIATION DES ETATS GENERAUX DES ETUDIANTS DE L'EUROPE (AEGEE) (Special Consultative Status granted in 1998)

1. Introductory statement recalling the aims and purposes of the Organization

The *Association des Etats Généraux des Etudiants de l'Europe* (AEGEE) was established in 1985 as a forum for young Europeans. AEGEE promotes a unified Europe without prejudices, strives towards an open and tolerant society and fosters democracy, human rights, international cooperation and a European dimension in education. It is AEGEE's mission to inform and educate the young people of Europe about European values, its diverse cultures and its heritage, to find realistic solutions to social and political problems, to build and strengthen democracy and civil society as well as a culture of peace and cooperation, to extend the range of educational opportunities available to young people throughout Europe and to encourage and facilitate youth mobility, activism and integration. AEGEE's fields of action are: cultural exchange, active citizenship, higher education and peace and stability. AEGEE is one of the largest European interdisciplinary student associations uniting approximately 15.000 students in 240 local organizations, operating in 41 countries all over Europe. AEGEE is a secular, politically independent, non-profit organization.

2. Cooperation with United Nations bodies and specialized agencies

Throughout the quadrennium 2002-2005, the organization maintained relations to ECOSOC and other United Nations bodies and agencies as UNESCO and the World Bank. Representatives of AEGEE have also actively participated in the first phase of the World Summit on the Information Society (WSIS) in Geneva, Switzerland (10-12 December 2003).

Economic and Social Commission (ECOSOC)

AEGEE has not been present at ECOSOC meetings during the period 2002-2005. However, a representative of AEGEE participated in the "10-Year Review of the World Programme of Action for Youth (WPAY)" held in New York, 3-7 October 2005, organized by the Department of Economic and Social Affairs' Youth at the United Nations Division of Social Development. The representative helped to prepare the interactive and informal roundtable discussion "Young people: Making Commitments Matter," participated actively in side events organized by other youth NGOs, observed the meetings of the Third Committee, the plenary meetings of the General Assembly and informed the organization about the outcome of the conference.

UNESCO

Since its successful participation in the "World Conference on Higher Education in the Twenty-first Century: Vision and Action" held in Paris, France, 5-9 October 1998, AEGEE is actively involved in consulting UNESCO concerning higher education. Between 2002 and 2005, AEGEE representatives participated in several follow-up conferences and meetings such as the "First Global Forum on International Quality Assurance, Accreditation and the Recognition of Qualifications in Higher Education" in Paris, 17-18 October 2002, the "8th UNESCO/NGO Collective Consultation on Higher Education" in Paris, 13-15 January 2003 or the "Meeting of Higher Education Partners – World Conference on Higher Education +5" in Paris, 23-25 June 2003. On 1 December 2004, AEGEE representatives met with the UNESCO Youth Unit for informal consultations. In 2005, AEGEE participated in the "9th

UNESCO/NGO Collective Consultation on Higher Education” in Paris, 6-8 April; a representative was present in several workshops and contributed to the statement of student organizations. AEGEE was also present at the 4th UNESCO Youth Forum in Paris, 30 September - 2 October 2005 on “Young People and the Dialogue among Civilizations, Cultures and Peoples – Ideas for Action in Education, the Sciences, Culture and Communication.” The representative participated in several workshops and provided input for the final outcome document of the conference. AEGEE also participated in the International Conference of NGOs maintaining official relations with UNESCO “Knowledge for All ‘To Ensure Sustainable Development’,” 14-16 December 2005, Paris; the representative was part of the group of NGOs preparing the establishment of the Youth Joint Programmatic Commissions (JPC Youth).

World Bank

In October 2003, the World Bank launched the European Essay Competition “Imagine” which invited young people from all over Europe to develop concrete and innovative proposals on the role of Europeans in fighting poverty and in achieving the Millennium Development Goals. The competition was organized in partnership with AEGEE and other organizations. As a partner, AEGEE advertised and promoted the 2003-2004 competition’s theme “Radically Reducing World Poverty: What Role for Europeans?” and encouraged its members and students all over Europe to participate. AEGEE was also a partner in the 2004-2005 competition “Building a Secure Future, Seeking Practical Solutions.” Besides promoting the competition, representatives of AEGEE were part of the Steering Committee, regulating the format and content of the competition, as well as the Selection Committee (Jury), evaluating and pre-selecting the submitted essays.

World Summit on the Information Society (WSIS)

AEGEE participated actively in the first phase of WSIS, especially its preparatory process. Representatives of AEGEE were present at PrepCom-1 in Geneva, Switzerland, 1-5 July 2002 and PrepCom-2 in Geneva, 17-28 February. The Secretary General of AEGEE submitted a paper on e-learning (WSIS/PC-3/C/0057) during the Intersessional Meeting between PrepCom-2 and PrepCom-3 in Paris, France, 15-18 July 2003. Representatives of AEGEE were also present at PrepCom-3 in Geneva, participated as observers at WSIS in Geneva, 10-12 December 2003, and informed the organization about its results. In November 2003, AEGEE also organized seven European seminars related to WSIS in cooperation with its partner TakingITGlobal.

3. Other relevant activities in conformity with the spirit, purposes and principles of the United Nations

Each year, AEGEE organizes a large variety of international events and projects – within the framework of its main fields of action – in order to promote international cooperation and understanding. Those events are not directly linked to the United Nations but reflect the spirit of its charter.

Odessa National University Model United Nations (ONUMUN)

Since 2003, AEGEE-Odessa, the local branch of AEGEE in Odessa, Ukraine, organizes ONUMUN in cooperation with the Odessa National University. Model United Nations (MUN) simulate the work of the United Nations, its bodies and agencies, and enable

students to experience the principles and purposes of the United Nations charter as well as international diplomacy and negotiation. MUNs also foster international cooperation and understanding among students. AEGEE-Odessa helped to organize three MUNs so far: on 29-30 November 2003, 26-28 November 2004 and 25-27 November 2005. About 100 students from all over Europe participate each year.

International Projects

Within the framework of the main fields of action, AEGEE organizes several international projects each year. The “Youth and Globalisation” project organized in 2003, 2004 and 2005, explored the role of youth in fostering civil society and encouraged international youth cooperation. Within this project AEGEE organized the “World Youth Summit on Youth and Globalization,” 10-12 December 2003 in Brussels, Belgium which brought together 200 young people and NGO representatives from all over the globe to discuss the economic, political and cultural effects of globalisation on youth. “EuroIslam,” a project organized in 2004 and 2005, aimed to foster intercultural dialogue between all religions and religious communities, especially Muslims and Christians in Europe. “The Bridge: Connecting Mobility and Disability,” organized in 2004 and 2005, addressed the mobility and integration of young people with disabilities in the work of NGOs in order to enable their participation in the development of civil society. “Tolerance – Acceptance – Peace,” organized in 2005, consisted of a series of seminars and events on conflict and conflict resolution such as “Peacebuilding and Peacekeeping – Concepts, Strategies and Initiatives for a Peaceful Europe” 8-12 December 2005 in Fribourg, Switzerland, or the “Conflict Resolution Training Course” organized 14-18 December 2005 in Skopje, Macedonia.

2. BRAHMA KUMARIS WORLD SPIRITUAL UNIVERSITY

(General Consultative Status granted in 1998)

Introductory Statement

The aims of the Brahma Kumaris World Spiritual University (BKWSU) include:

Offering to people of all walks of life a simple, and accessible education in spiritual and moral understanding, principles and values to build human capacity; to reaffirm the spiritual identity, inherent goodness, worth and dignity of the human being and bring about a positive change of awareness, attitude and behaviour as the foundation for the overall advancement and betterment of the human condition; to foster long-term human-centred development, offering a spiritual perspective of contemporary issues of personal, community and world concern and facilitating a greater awareness of corresponding rights and responsibilities.

The BKWSU is a member of the Conference of Non-Governmental Organizations (CONGO). The University’s collaboration with other organizations include: Co-chair and member of Coordinating Council of the Values Caucus in New York. Member of the World Summit on the Information Society (WSIS) Values and Ethics Caucus, a working group set up during the preparatory meetings. Member of the Bureau of the NGO Committee on the Freedom of Religion and Belief and chaired a briefing on behalf of the Committee on “the Report of the Panel of Eminent Persons on UN and Civil Society Relations.” Participates in the Committee on Spirituality, Values and Global Concerns and the Committee on Human Rights, and co-convenes the “*Jumping the Fence task force*” of the NGO Committee on the Status of Women. Cooperates with other organizations in the preparation of joint statements on UN-related issues.

The BKWSU's geographical membership has increased since 2002, in 18 more countries, giving it a presence in a total of 101 countries, territories and islands. During this quadrennial period the "Serve Africa" initiative has made a concerted effort to focus on that region. The BKWSU's source of funding remained substantially unchanged during the quadrennial period.

In Uruguay, a research paper was prepared in consultation with and published by UNESCO on the topic of: *“Values Underlying the Uruguayan Culture.”*

UN International Day of Peace: Through its network of centres worldwide, the BKWSU works with local communities and involves various sectors of society to focus on world peace on 21st September. Activities are done in collaboration with UN Information Centres, UNESCO, UNDP, UNICEF and civil society organizations. **UN World Environment Day**: The Scientists and Engineers’ Professional Wing of the BKWSU engages the local officials and environmentalists in dialogue on issues of the state of the earth. **International Year of Mountains 2002**: In Moscow more than 200 sport veterans, including the first Soviet Mount Everest climbers, dialogued on *“My Peak, My Olympus”* highlighting values that help achieve great results and overcome challenges. A photo exhibit was held at UNIC in Moscow.

Other relevant activities: In Support of the UN Millennium Development Goals (MDGs)

Goal 1. Achieve Universal Primary Education: The Living Values Education Programme supported by the BKWSU focuses on primary and secondary levels. It is currently being implemented in more than 8,000 sites in nearly 80 countries. Other programmes include

Activities for Refugees and Children Affected by War, Street Children and Drug Rehabilitation.

Goal 3. Promote Gender Equality and Empower Women: International Women's Day is used to encourage the role of women through public forums, residential retreats, seminars and dialogues on processes of capacity-building, inner empowerment, gender equality and respect.

Goal 6. Combat HIV/AIDS, Malaria and other Diseases: In India, the Global Hospital and Research Centre, managed by the BKWSU, works in partnership with the World Health Organization in the STOP TB Campaign. The Hospital's Village Outreach Programme works to reduce child mortality and to improve maternal health by providing nutritional supplements, health checkups and the immunization of village children. An associate of the BKWSU, The Janki Foundation for Global Health Care's initiative *Values in Healthcare: A Spiritual Approach*, offers personal and team development programme for healthcare practitioners.

Goal 7. Ensuring Environmental Sustainability: The BKWSU has spearheaded the installation and use of solar energy within rural communities. The research and development programme of the Department of Renewable Energy in operation at its headquarters covers: Hybrid alternative energy systems, Passive solar architecture, Photovoltaic power packs, Solar hot water plants, and steam cooking systems, and Water recycling technologies.

Goal 8. Develop a Global Partnership for Development: The annual Call-of-the-Time Dialogue Series provides the space for policy makers to have conversations filled with insights, ideas and fresh perspectives so that the seeds of true partnerships are developed.

Emergency Relief: (1) Tsunami Relief Activities: The BKWSU helped to identify the immediate needs of Tsunami victims in Sri Lanka. Basic requirements and medical supplies were transported to the camps while care was also taken to help build mental stamina in over 30,000 affected families in Colombo, Kandy and Batticaloa.

3. INTERNATIONAL RESEARCH FOUNDATION FOR DEVELOPMENT (IRFD)

(Special Category Consultative Status granted in 1998)

Aims and Purposes of the Organization, Membership, Funding, and Affiliations

The International Research Foundation for Development, Inc. is an autonomous, nonpartisan, transnational organization composed of an international community of contemplative thinkers, policy makers, practitioners, and laypersons who are making a concerted effort to improve the quality of life at various levels of the world.

The purposes of the International Research Foundation for Development, Inc. are: 1. to establish and maintain an integrated global network for scientific policy research and advocacy on contemporary development issues; 2. to create a global community of cooperation and partnership for human concerns of sustainable development: socioeconomic, politico-cultural, educational and scientific; 3. to generate and disseminate original and transcendental thought: cross-cultural, cross-nationalistic, cross-regional, and cross-disciplinary; 4. to strengthen civil society intervention in global policy making; 5. to create a viable partnership at all levels for global peace and sustainable development for the new millennium; 6. to launch development projects at community levels.

The foundation has collaborative affiliations with international NGOs in consultative status such as International Association for Media and Communication Research (IAMCR); International Institute for Sustainable Development; Commonwealth Human Ecology; World University Services; Greenpeace International; and World Federalist Movement. Furthermore, IRFD has been working collaboratively with many international research institutions, universities, regional organizations, think tanks and advisory groups.

The foundation's sources of funding are: contributions from regional networks, membership fees and conference registration fees, donor agencies, contributions from individuals. The foundation's membership has increased significantly.

Mauritius Conference 2005, University Mauritius – Mauritius – January 10-11, 2005, and Freeport Exhibition Center, Port Louis, Mauritius – January 10, 2005; 4. Tunis 2005 Conference, Renaissance Tunis Hotel – Tunis, Tunisia – November 14-15, 2005, and Kram Center, Tunis, Tunisia – November 16, 2005. These four conferences and events were parallel to the United Nations World Summits and Special Sessions of the General Assembly, and UN International Meetings: World Summit on Sustainable Development (WSSD); World Summit on the Information Society (WSIS) Phase I & II; and UN International Meeting on Small Island Developing States. These conferences have been used as a window for policy advocacy, furthering research and global education focusing on the implementation gaps on development arenas in view of contributing to the work of the United Nations.

4. MARYKNOLL SISTERS OF ST. DOMINIC, INC.

(Special Consultative Status granted 1998)

Introduction: Aims and purposes of the organization

The purpose of the Maryknoll Sisters of St. Dominic (hereafter referred to as the *Maryknoll Sisters*) is to participate in the mission presence and activity of the Catholic Church and was established as a response to the needs for a global mission. To accomplish this, the Maryknoll Sisters reach out to peoples of other lands, bridging the barriers of differing cultures, races and religions in order to: to learn and understand; to promote a more just and humane society; to offer solidarity, hope and love to a world broken and divided by hatred, conflict and violence.

Membership and work

Since the 2002 Quadrennial Report, the Maryknoll Sisters continue to live and work with the people of twenty-six countries located in Africa, Asia, the Pacific Islands, South and North America. Membership from these areas now include women from Taiwan, Province of China, the Republic of Korea, Philippines, Myanmar, Vietnam, Tanzania, Zimbabwe and several countries of Central and South America.

There has been a conscious effort in each locality to assist in fulfilling the UN MDG's. In order to do this, Maryknoll Sisters as a UN NGO has worked closely with the Maryknoll Fathers & Brothers' NGO; with Maryknoll Lay Missioners and Affiliate Volunteers; with civil society and local NGO's in every Region. Their activities consist of: work with poor, with migrant women in the world's largest urban areas. Because projects which support local agriculture and economics are very important, members have cooperated with local communities in small development projects and education programs.

In Africa, they cooperated in work of HIV/AIDS relief; with women, in youth formation and education, and in agriculture and ecological projects. Peace and reconciliation has become a vital need for effort.

In Asia, together with local groups they served migrants, especially those requiring resettlement, those persons in need of education, those suffering from HIV/AIDS; and also, in the restoration of educational institutions.

In Latin America, among other works, they closely cooperated with local efforts in agriculture, education, health (HIV/AIDS) and self-help and poverty-relief programs, and with youth training programs.

In North America there has been increasing efforts to aid the urgent needs of immigrant peoples.

In all Regions, local efforts are often not enough, so in tandem, our members have connected with other NGO's and look to the United Nations for solutions.

Participation in the Economic and Social Council and its subsidiary bodies and/or conferences and other United Nations meetings

As an NGO with Special Consultative Status, the Maryknoll Sisters closely followed the ECOSOC yearly agendas, and made substantial efforts to respond. The Maryknoll Sisters are members of the Committee on Non-Governmental Organizations (**CONGO**) and Non-

Governmental Liaison Service (NGLS). They have participated in the following *Committee Working Groups*: Disarmament, Sustainable Development, Ecumenical, Social Development, Racism, and Indigenous; & *Caucus*: Women, HIV/AIDS and Earth Values.

In particular the NGO has sent representatives, often from southern regions to participate in the following UN conferences, meetings and programs and have co-sponsored Side Events at these Conferences:
