United Nations Voluntary Fund for Victims of Torture

Report of the Secretary-General

Summary

The present report updates the information contained in the report to the General Assembly on the activities of the United Nations Voluntary Fund for Victims of Torture (A/58/284) which provides information on the recommendations adopted by the Board of Trustees at its twenty-second session, which took place from 12 to 28 May 2003, and recent trends, in particular with respect to assistance provided to victims of torture and their relatives through the Fund, as well as the impact of this assistance on beneficiaries. The present report provides information on the contributions received and the pledges made since the publication of the report to the General Assembly, the financial needs for 2004 and the fund-raising activities of the Board. It also describes the implementation of the recommendations adopted at the twenty-second session as well as recent activities undertaken. A short addendum will be submitted to the Commission in March on the latest contributions available for the twenty-third session of the Board.

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I. ANNUAL REPORTS

1. In conformity with arrangements adopted by the General Assembly for the management of the United Nations Voluntary Fund for the Victims of Torture, the Secretary-General submits an annual report to the General Assembly, indicating the funds available, pledges made and contributions received, together with disbursements from the Fund (resolution 36/151 of 16 December 1981).

2. The present report, finalized on 1 December 2003, complements and updates the annual report, prepared on 14 August 2003 (A/58/284), to the Assembly at its fifty-eighth session under agenda item 119 (a). It is submitted in accordance with Commission resolution 2003/32.

II. EVALUATION OF THE FUNCTIONING OF THE FUND

3. As requested by the Commission on Human Rights in paragraph 39 of its resolution 2003/32, steps have been taken to initiate "an independent evaluation, in accordance with United Nations rules and regulations, of the functioning of the Fund, including in particular the lessons and best practices learned from the Fund's activities, with a view to further enhancing its effectiveness". The evaluation will be undertaken by the Office of Internal Oversight Services with two external consultants. In this respect, the draft terms of reference were sent to Member States on 26 November 2003 and a meeting will be convened on 12 December 2003 with interested delegations to discuss the document. The evaluation will entail a review of the impact of the activities of the Fund, both at headquarters and in the field. All regions where projects are funded and a cross-section of projects will be visited, in order to ensure as comprehensive a review as possible. An interim report of the evaluation will be submitted to the sixtieth session of the Commission on Human Rights and the final evaluation report will be submitted to the sixty-first session of the Commission.

III. FINANCIAL STATUS

A. Grants paid since the last session of the Board

4. At its twenty-second session (12-28 May 2003), the Board of Trustees of the Fund had recommended grants for a little over \$7 million for projects around the world providing medical, psychological, social, legal and financial assistance for victims of torture and members of their families. These recommendations were approved by the Acting High Commissioner for Human Rights on behalf of the Secretary-General. As at 1 December 2003, based on information available to the Office of the High Commissioner, the amount of grants paid since the last session of the Board is US\$ 5.2 million. An amount of US\$ 1.8 million, allocated for grants still pending, could be disbursed by the next session of the Board once additional information requested by the Board or the Fund secretariat is received from the organizations concerned, and deemed satisfactory. A list of organizations financed by the Fund in 2003 is attached as an annex. An amount of US\$ 50,000 has also been set aside for organizations that might experience financial difficulties prior to the next Board session (10-27 May 2004), or for individual requests by victims of torture in countries where no projects are financed.

B. Contributions paid

5. The contributions received in time for allocation at the twenty-second session of the Board are detailed in the report of the Secretary-General to the General Assembly (A/58/284, para. 9, table 1). Contributions that had not been officially recorded by the Treasurer of the United Nations before the twenty-second session and were recorded afterwards are shown in table 1 below, drawn up on 1 December 2003 from the information available to the Office of the High Commissioner. The Board will take these into consideration at its twenty-third session, together with any others that are duly recorded before 10 May 2004. Contributions paid after 1 December 2003 will be reflected in an addendum to the present report.

7. Any contribution officially recorded by the Treasurer of the United Nations after 10 May 2004 will be reflected in the accounts for the following session (May 2005). The Board adopts its funding recommendations on the basis of the contributions actually paid and recorded in the Fund's account by the Treasurer; it does not take pledges into consideration.

IV. FUND-RAISING

8. The General Assembly, in its resolution 57/200 of 18 December 2002, the Commission, in its resolution 2003/32 (para. 34) of 23 April 2003, the Committee against Torture, the Board of Trustees of the Fund, the Special Rapporteur of the Commission on Human Rights on the question of torture and the United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights, as stated in the joint declaration and message on the occasion of the United Nations International Day in Support of Victims of Torture, 26 June 2003, expressed their gratitude and appreciation to those Governments, organizations and individuals that had contributed to the Fund. The United Nations bodies particularly concerned with issues relating to torture encouraged donors that had already contributed to the Fund to continue such contributions, if possible with a substantial increase, in order to take into consideration the ever-increasing requests for assistance. They also appealed to Governments, organizations and individuals to contribute regularly to the Fund, if possible on an annual basis, preferably by 1 March of each year, so that their contributions could be duly recorded and available for allocation at the Board's following session or, in any event, before the Board's annual meeting.

9. In its resolution 36/151, in which it established the Fund, the General Assembly authorized the Board to promote and solicit contributions and pledges. The Assembly also requested the Secretary-General to give the Board all the assistance it might require. The Board members have the opportunity to solicit contributions at the annual meeting with representatives of the permanent missions to the United Nations Office at Geneva, generally held on the last day of the Board's session. The Commission has introduced the practice of inviting the Chair or a Board member, if they are present in Geneva during the Commission's session in March/April, to submit to the Commission, under the relevant agenda item, an update on the financial situation of the Fund and to encourage participants to pay their contributions before the Board meeting in May. A statement by the Chairman was read by the secretariat on his behalf on 8 April 2003.

10. Within the framework of the fund-raising strategy launched by the Board in 2002, based on a more regional approach to donors, meetings will be arranged between the Chairman of the twenty-second session and States members of the five regional groups, during early 2004.

V. NEEDS ASSESSMENT FOR 2004

A. Requests received and grants awarded (2000-2004)

11. In order to take into account the disparity between the requests for grants and the available resources that could be allocated for such grants (see table 3 below), as well as the constant upgrading of the projects submitted for funding and the increasing amount of grant funding allocated each year, for several years the Board has recommended that almost the total amount should be awarded. As a result, all that is left for the following year is the compulsory reserve, which, in accordance with the United Nations rules applicable to voluntary contributions for humanitarian purposes, is set at 15 per cent of the amount available for grants (see A/55/178, paragraph 11).

^a The implementation rate shows that the Fund systematically disburses more than 80 per cent of the amount approved for grants by the following session of the Board. The remaining balance consists of pending grants for which additional information is still needed before they can be paid.

^b The implementation rate for the year 2003 will be available in May 2004 before the next session of the Board.

B. Estimated needs for 2004

12. On the basis of the requests received for 2003 (amounting to US\$ 13 million), the Board estimated that US\$ 14 million would be needed at its next session to cover all new requests envisaged, as the amount requested has increased by US\$ 1 million every year since 1998.

13. As of 1 December 2003, total new contributions paid since the last session of the Board amounted to a mere US\$ 202,365 (see table 1 above) and pledges received by the same date to only US\$ 82,606 (see table 2 above).

VI. HOW TO MAKE A CONTRIBUTION

14. Contributions to the Fund should always be marked as follows: “payee: United Nations Voluntary Fund for Victims of Torture, account CH”. Payments may be made either by bank transfer: (a) in United States dollars or in other currencies to “United Nations Geneva General Fund”, account No. 485001802, J.P. Donors are requested to inform the secretariat of the Fund and the Resource Mobilization Unit when a payment has been made (a copy of the bank transfer order or of the cheque would be appreciated) to facilitate effective follow-up on the official recording procedure and preparation of the Secretary-General’s reports.

VII. CONCLUSIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

15. Pursuant to the appeals by the General Assembly, the Commission on Human Rights, the Secretary-General, the High Commissioner for Human Rights and the Board of Trustees of the Fund, donors are invited to pay their contributions to the Fund prior to 1 March 2004 to enable the Board to take them into account at its twenty-second session, in May 2004.

16. The General Assembly, the Commission, the Secretary-General, the High Commissioner and the Board have also urged regular donors to increase their contributions if possible in order to give the Board the resources to meet the growing needs of torture victims and their relatives.

17. The Board strongly encourages Governments that have not yet contributed to the Fund to do so for the first time, preferably before 1 March 2004.
