Statement

Extensive research and experience has revealed that rights violations represent important underlying causes of livelihood insecurity among women. In much of the world, especially in Africa, a lack of access to assets and resources is symptomatic of underlying discrimination, exploitation and exclusion.

The constitutions and laws of our various countries are founded on the ideals of freedom, equality and justice. But, unfortunately, those rights and ideals have remained mere theoretical postulations without any practical bearing on the lives and conditions of women. Women are systematically relegated to inferior positions, especially in Africa.

There is gross inequality between men and women. Undoubtedly, the most delicate and difficult aspect of those rights is the enforcement of guaranteed rights. Until the rights of women are properly and timely interpreted and enforced, attempts to help women change their lives will necessarily always result in achievements that are limited in scope and longevity. Therefore, for us to have a just, democratic and egalitarian society that realizes and enforces the rights of women, we must remake the material conditions of life and usher in a new social order that promotes socioeconomic justice. This implies that the enforcement of the rights of women must be articulated and achieved.

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
