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Statement

Yayasan Pendidikan Indonesia initiative to help former commercial sex workers

Yayasan Pendidikan Indonesia, the certifying authority for Indonesia of the European Computer Driving Licence/International Computer Driving Licence, proposes that the Government and non-governmental organizations in East Java work together to close prostitution centres in East Java Province.

The programme we propose, "Joint project between Yayasan Pendidikan Indonesia and its partners for humanitarian services", will empower former commercial sex workers to learn basic information and communications technology skills. The programme will be implemented in cooperation with interested Islamic secondary schools, which have been accredited as International Computer Driving Licence-approved test centres, and other partners from Government and civil society.

Through the initiative, Yayasan Pendidikan Indonesia and its partners aim to raise awareness of the importance of the ability of former commercial sex workers to live full and enriching lives as well as to contribute to society.

The initiative corresponds to our overall objective of supporting the creation of a safe and effective digital society. We continually improve our technical programmes offered to the general public, and try to reach all segments of society with our information technology literacy programmes to enable people to work locally or internationally, with their International Computer Driving Licence certificate in hand.

The International Computer Driving Licence programme has been present in the region since 2003 and has been enjoyed by many, including women. It also caters to divorcees, jobseekers, retirees and people with disabilities, as they tend to be on the periphery of economic opportunities and welfare.

Our Chairman, Datuk Agung Sidayu, stated:

"Our primary goal is to enhance the social and economic well-being of all Indonesian citizens through learning of essential information and communications technology skills. Since the inception of the International Computer Driving Licence, our philosophy has been based on empowering people, all the people, with digital skills to improve their quality of life. This new and unique initiative by Yayasan Pendidikan Indonesia and its partners, governmental and non-governmental organizations, which involves former commercial sex workers is an example of our renewed commitment to remain an inclusive programme for all, irrespective of age, background and gender. They have as much potential as any other individual and deserve the opportunity to realize their potential. As we look to a brighter future, we call on others to join us and expand their reach so that one day they can access their learning and individual development desires."
