SUMMARY STATEMENT BY THE SECRETARY-GENERAL ON MATTERS OF WHICH THE SECURITY COUNCIL IS SEIZED AND ON THE STAGE REACHED IN THEIR CONSIDERATION

- 1. Pursuant to rule 11 of the provisional rules of procedure of the Security Council, the Secretary-General wishes to submit hereunder the list of items of which the Security Council is currently seized, with references in parentheses to the previous summary statements that have been issued covering consideration of each item.
- 2. It will be recalled that in the interest of economy the Secretary-General reproduces only once annually the full, up-to-date list of items of which the Security Council is seized. In fulfilment of his responsibility under rule 11, an addendum to the basic list is issued weekly, making reference to those items on which further action has been taken by the Council during the week covered or indicating that there has been no change during that period.
- 3. The last full summary statement was issued on 9 January 1979 (S/13033). The last weekly addendum (S/13033/Add.51) covered developments through 29 December 1979. Since that date, that is, during the week ending 5 January 1980, the Security Council took action on the following items:

Letter dated 22 December 1979 from the Permanent Representative of the United States of America to the United Nations addressed to the President of the Security Council (See S/13033/Add.51)

The Security Council continued its consideration of the item at its 2183rd and 2184th meetings, held on 30 and 31 December 1979. In addition to the representatives invited previously, the President, with the consent of the Council, invited the representative of Japan, at his request, to participate in the discussion without the right to vote.

At the 2183rd meeting, the President called attention to the text of the draft resolution contained in document S/13711, sponsored by the United States of America. At the 2184th meeting, the President called attention to document S/13711/Rev.l, which contained the revised text of the draft resolution sponsored by the United States of America.

The Security Council then voted on the revised draft resolution contained in document S/13711/Rev.l and adopted it by a vote of 11 votes in favour, none against, with 4 abstentions (Bangladesh, Czechoslovakia, Kuwait, Union of Soviet Socialist Republics) as resolution 461 (1979).

Resolution 461 (1979) reads as follows:

The Security Council,

Recalling its resolution 457 (1979) of 4 December 1979,

Recalling also the appeal made by the President of the Security Council, on 9 November 1979 (S/13616), which was reiterated on 27 November 1979 (S/13652),

Gravely concerned over the increasing tension between the Islamic Republic of Iran and the United States of America caused by the seizure and prolonged detention of persons of United States nationality who are being held as hostages in Iran in violation of international law, and which could have grave consequences for international peace and security,

Taking note of the letters from the Minister for Foreign Affairs of the Islamic Republic of Iran dated 13 November 1979 (S/13626) and 1 December 1979 (S/13671) relating to the grievances and statements of his Government on the situation,

Recalling also the letter dated 25 November 1979 from the Secretary-General (S/13646) stating that, in his opinion, the present crisis between the Islamic Republic of Iran and the United States of America poses a serious threat to international peace and security,

Taking into account the Order of the International Court of Justice of 15 December 1979 calling on the Government of the Islamic Republic of Iran to ensure the immediate release, without any exception, of all persons of United States nationality, who are being held as hostages in Iran (S/13697) and also calling on the Government of the United States of America and the Government of the Islamic Republic of Iran to ensure that no action is taken by them which will aggravate the tension between the two countries,

Further taking into account the report of the Secretary-General of 22 December 1979 on developments of the situation (S/13704),

<u>l'indful of</u> the obligation of States to settle their international disputes by peaceful means in such a manner that international peace and security, and justice, are not endangered,

Conscious of the responsibility of States to refrain in their international relations from the threat or use of force against the territorial integrity or political independence of any State, or in any other manner inconsistent with the purposes of the United Nations,

- 1. Reaffirms its resolution 457 (1979) in all its aspects;
- 2. <u>Deplores</u> the continued detention of the hostages contrary to Security Council resolution 457 (1979) and the Order of the International Court of Justice of 15 December 1979 (S/13697);
- 3. <u>Urgently calls</u>, once again, on the Government of the Islamic Republic of Iran to release immediately all persons of United States nationality being held as hostages in Iran, to provide them protection and to allow them to leave the country;
- 4. Reiterates its request to the Secretary-General to lend his good offices and to intensify his efforts with a view to assisting the Council to achieve the objectives called for in this resolution, and in this connexion takes note of his readiness to go personally to Iran;
- 5. Requests the Secretary-General to report to the Council on his good offices efforts before the Council meets again;
- 6. Decides to meet on 7 January 1980 in order to review the situation and, in the event of non-compliance with this resolution, to adopt effective measures under Articles 39 and 41 of the Charter of the United Nations.

Letter dated 3 January 1980 addressed to the President of the Security Council by the representatives of Australia, the Bahamas, Bahrain, Bangladesh, Belgium, Canada, Chile, China, Colombia, Costa Rica, Denmark, the Dominican Republic, Ecuador, Egypt, El Salvador, Fiji, Germany, Federal Republic of, Greece, Haiti, Honduras, Iceland, Indonesia, Italy, Japan, Liberia, Luxembourg, Malaysia, the Netherlands, New Zealand, Norway, Oman, Pakistan, Panama, Papua New Guinea, the Philippines, Portugal, Saint Lucia, Samoa, Saudi Arabia, Senegal, Singapore, Somalia, Spain, Suriname, Sweden, Thailand, Turkey, Uganda, the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland, the United States of America, Uruguay and Venezuela (S/13724 and Add.1 and 2)

In a letter dated 3 January 1980 addressed to the President of the Security Council (S/13724), the representatives of Australia, Bahamas, Belgium, Canada, Chile, China, Colombia, Costa Rica, Denmark, the Dominican Republic, Ecuador, Egypt, El Salvador, Fiji, the Federal Republic of Germany, Greece, Haiti, Honduras, Iceland, Italy, Japan, Liberia, Luxembourg, Netherlands, New Zealand, Norway, Cman, Pakistan, Panama, Papua New Guinea, the Philippines, Portugal, Saint Lucia, Saudi Arabia, Singapore, Spain, Suriname, Sweden, Turkey, the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland, the United States of America, Uruguay and Venezuela requested an urgent meeting of the Security Council to consider the situation in Afghanistan and its implications for international peace and security. Subsequently, the representatives of Bahrain, Bangladesh, Indonesia, Malaysia, Samoa, Senegal, Somalia, Thailand and Uganda joined as signatories to the request for the meeting (S/13724/Add.1 and 2).

The Security Council met to consider the question at its 2185th meeting, held on 5 January 1980. Following statements by the representatives of the USSR, the German Democratic Republic, Bangladesh, Norway and China, the agenda was adopted. The Council continued its consideration of the item at its 2186th meeting, held on 5 January 1980.

In the course of the discussion, the President, with the consent of the Council, invited the representatives of Afghanistan, Australia, Bulgaria, Canada, Colombia, Costa Rica, Democratic Kampuchea, Egypt, Japan, Liberia, Malaysia, Mongolia, New Zealand, Pakistan, Poland, Saudi Arabia, Singapore, Somalia and Turkey, at their request, to participate in the discussion without the right to vote.

- 4. In the course of 1979, that portion of the item "Complaint by Zambia" relating to the complaint by Zambia against Portugal submitted on 15 July 1969 (S/9331), which was listed as item 65 in the last full summary statement (S/13033), was deleted from the list pursuant to the request contained in a letter dated 10 May 1979 from the Permanent Representative of Zambia. With the consent of the Security Council, the Secretary-General therefore deleted from the list of matters of which the Security Council is seized the references under item 65 to documents S/9346, S/9364 and S/9373 which relate to the Council's consideration of that portion of the item.
