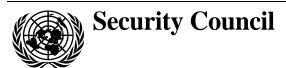
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Letter dated 16 December 2005 from the Chairman of the Security Council Committee established pursuant to resolution 1540 (2004) addressed to the President of the Security Council

Report to the Security Council by the Chairman of the Security Council Committee established pursuant to resolution 1540 (2004)

I. Introduction

- 1. The present document reports on the activities undertaken and the results achieved during the period 1 January to 16 December 2005 by the Security Council Committee established pursuant to resolution 1540 (2004).
- 2. The report is generated by the Chairman and is therefore subject to his judgement and responsibilities. However, the Chairman of the Committee has consulted with the members of the Committee with the intention of producing a report that takes into account the shared opinions of all members.

II. Legal framework

- 3. The Security Council unanimously adopted resolution 1540 (2004) on 28 April 2004. With resolution 1540 the Council affirmed that the proliferation of nuclear, chemical and biological weapons, as well as their means of delivery, constitutes a threat to international peace and security. Acting under Chapter VII of the Charter of the United Nations, the Council decided the following:
 - That States shall refrain from providing any support to non-State actors that attempt to develop, acquire, manufacture, possess, transport, transfer or use nuclear, chemical or biological weapons and their means of delivery
 - That States shall adopt and enforce appropriate effective laws that prohibit any non-State actor from manufacturing, acquiring, possessing, developing, transporting, transferring or using nuclear, chemical or biological weapons and their means of delivery
 - That States shall take and enforce effective measures to establish domestic controls to prevent the proliferation of such weapons and their means of delivery. National controls include measures to secure and protect such items; export and border controls; controls on transhipment and re-export and on providing funds and services relating to such export and transhipment such as financing and transporting that would contribute to proliferation; end-use controls; law-enforcement efforts; and the development and improvement of appropriate legislation and administrative provisions.

Resolution 1540 (2004) imposes binding obligations on all States to take legislative and administrative actions in accordance with their national procedures without altering the rights and obligations of States parties to the Treaty on the Non-Proliferation of Nuclear Weapons, the Convention on the Prohibition of the Development, Production, Stockpiling and Use of Chemical Weapons and on Their Destruction (Chemical Weapons Convention) and the Convention on the Prohibition of the Development, Production and Stockpiling of Bacteriological (Biological) and Toxin Weapons and on Their Destruction (Biological Weapons Convention) or the

responsibilities of the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) or the Organization for the Prohibition of Chemical Weapons.

III. Hiring of experts

- 4. On 20 December 2004, the Secretary-General informed the President of the Security Council of his intention to appoint four experts to assist the Committee in the process of consideration of the national reports submitted pursuant to resolution 1540 (2004).
- 5. On 7 January 2005, the Security Council took note of the Secretary-General's intention.
- 6. In February and March, the four experts signed the contracts offered by the Department for Disarmament Affairs and started working for the Committee.
- 7. On 6 May 2005, the Secretary-General informed the President of the Security Council that the Committee, on 19 April 2005, had approved the recruitment of additional experts and that he had appointed four experts to assist the Committee.
- 8. In June and July 2005, the four newly appointed experts joined the existing group of experts.
- 9. The appointment of eight experts is consistent with the relevant provisions of resolution 1540 (2004) and with the Committee's guidelines for the conduct of its work.

IV. Briefings to the Security Council and programme of work

- 10. On 25 April 2005, the Chairman of the Committee informed the Security Council of the progress achieved and of the programme of work of the Committee for the period 1 April to 30 June.
- 11. On 11 July 2005, the Chairman informed the Security Council of the progress achieved and of the programme of work of the Committee for the period 1 July to 30 September.
- 12. On 26 October 2005, the Chairman informed the Security Council of the progress achieved and of the programme of work of the Committee for the period 1 October to 31 December.
- 13. Key issues of all programmes of work included the examination of reports, the encouragement of further reports by means of outreach activities and the facilitation of assistance in implementing resolution 1540. They also included interaction with international organizations and the maintenance of full transparency of the Committee's activities.

V. Reporting

14. In its resolution 1540 (2004) the Council called upon all States to present to the Committee, no later than 28 October 2004, a first report on the steps they had taken or intended to take to implement the resolution. With the approval of the

Committee, the Chairman continued in 2005 to send to all States additional notes citing that deadline to encourage them to submit to the Committee their national reports. In addition, the Chairman participated in two meetings in New York organized by the group of Latin American and Caribbean States and by the group of Asian States to call upon Member States to submit their reports.

15. As of 16 December 2005, a total of 124 States and one organization had submitted reports to the Committee (see appendix I). The list of States that have yet to report is presented in appendix II.

VI. Examination of national reports

- 16. The Committee, with the support of its experts, has developed a matrix based on the provisions of the resolution, and they have used the matrix to examine national reports. The information provided in the first national reports has been summarized in the matrix. The matrix also includes additional information identified from the official public data provided by States to the United Nations, IAEA, the Organization for the Prohibition of Chemical Weapons and other international organizations on steps they have taken in the areas covered by resolution 1540.
- 17. On the basis of the preceding examination and for the purpose of completing its knowledge on the steps undertaken by States in responding to obligations set forth in resolution 1540, the Committee reached out to States that submitted their reports with a view to soliciting additional information or seeking clarification in areas covered by the first reports. Letters requesting additional information and/or clarification have been prepared for all 124 States that submitted the first national reports. Most have been sent to Member States; the remaining few will be dispatched shortly. In the spirit of transparency the Committee decided to share the matrix with the reporting States.
- 18. As of 16 December 2005, 42 States had responded to the Chairman's letters requesting additional information (see appendix III). They have submitted an updated report to the Committee in descriptive form and, in most cases, included an amended matrix. These reports have been displayed on the Committee's website in addition to the first national reports.

VII. Cooperation with international organizations and outreach

- 19. The Committee has agreed that some States may require technical assistance from the international organizations with expertise in the areas covered by resolution 1540 (2004), in particular from the International Atomic Energy Agency and the Organization for the Prohibition of Chemical Weapons, as the need arises.
- 20. On 13 April 2005, at the invitation of the Chairman, the Director-General of the Organization for the Prohibition of Chemical Weapons and representatives of the IAEA informed the Committee of the activities of the respective organizations, especially in the areas of assistance provided to improve the national implementation of the obligations under the Chemical Weapons Convention, the Treaty on the Non-Proliferation of Nuclear Weapons and the conventions on nuclear safety and security.

- 21. On 8 September 2005, the Chairman addressed the second World Conference of Speakers of Parliaments. That was the first occasion to reach out to leaders of national legislatures to inform them about resolution 1540 and seek their support in its implementation by incorporating its provisions into national legislation.
- 22. The Chairman, the members of the Committee and the experts have participated in seminars, workshops and conferences to explain the requirements of resolution 1540 and the activities of the Committee with a view to raising awareness and seeking support for the implementation of the resolution. A list of the respective events is annexed as appendix IV.

VIII. Assistance

- 23. In considering national reports the Committee has identified both information concerning types of assistance provided by some States and requests for assistance to implement resolution 1540. The Committee has compiled all such information in a structured manner. The information is available on the website of the Committee (see http://disarmament2.un.org/Committee1540). The Committee has indicated in which areas assistance can be provided by a specific country, as well as the way in which contacts for assistance could be established on a bilateral basis. The list of requests has been circulated in a note verbale to all States offering assistance.
- 24. The Committee will continue to act as a clearing house on the issue of assistance. In further examining the reports and additional information from States, the Committee will keep up-to-date information on the issue of assistance in order to contribute to the implementation of resolution 1540 (2004).
- 25. In order to perform effectively its role as a clearing house on assistance, the Committee has requested and will continue to request that States, as appropriate, designate points of contact for assistance.

IX. Transparency

26. Transparency has been a priority of the Committee's work. The Chairman and the Vice-Chairmen have reached out on a regular basis to the Member States. This includes work with United Nations media and joint briefings with the Chairmen of the Security Council Committee established pursuant to resolution 1373 (2001) concerning counter-terrorism (Counter-Terrorism Committee) and the Security Council Committee established pursuant to resolution 1267 (1999) concerning Al-Qaida and the Taliban and associated individuals and entities (Al-Qaida and Taliban Sanctions Committee). The Committee has kept updated its website as a source of information on issues related to resolution 1540.

X. General conclusion

27. The work performed in the period covered by the present report concentrated on making the Committee fully operational. The assistance extended to the Committee by its team of experts was highly useful, in particular in considering the national reports submitted by member States pursuant to resolution 1540 (2004). The Committee has achieved the targets set out in its programmes of work for 2005

and has thus created the necessary basis for the report of the Committee to the Security Council in April 2006.

- 28. The Committee looks forward to the cooperation of all States as it goes forward with its work in the coming months. Full implementation of resolution 1540 by all States in the form of national legislation and measures to enforce such legislation is a long-term objective that goes beyond the current mandate of the Committee. It will require continuous efforts at the national, regional and international levels to provide capacity-building and assistance.
- 29. The Committee is confident that the Security Council will consider how best to ensure that the work of the Committee will make an enduring contribution to non-proliferation.
