
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Summary statement by the Secretary-General on matters of which the Security Council is seized and on the stage reached in their consideration

Addendum

Pursuant to rule 11 of the provisional rules of procedure of the Security Council, the Secretary-General is submitting the following summary statement.

The list of items of which the Security Council is seized is contained in documents S/2006/10 of 1 March 2006, S/2006/10/Add.12 of 7 April 2006, S/2006/10/Add.15 of 28 April 2006, S/2006/10/Add.16 of 5 May 2006, S/2006/10/Add.21 of 9 June 2006 and S/2006/10/Add.24 of 30 June 2006.

During the week ending 1 July 2006, the Security Council took action on the following items:

Meeting of the Security Council with the troop-contributing countries to the United Nations Operation in Burundi pursuant to resolution 1353 (2001), annex II, sections A and B (see S/2004/20/Add.47; and S/2005/15/Add.20 and 47)

The Security Council resumed its consideration of the item at its 5475th (private) meeting, held on 27 June 2006 in accordance with the understanding reached in its prior consultations.

At the close of the meeting, in accordance with rule 55 of the provisional rules of procedure of the Security Council, the following communiqué was issued through the Secretary-General in place of a verbatim record:

On 27 June 2006, the Security Council, pursuant to annex II, sections A and B, of resolution 1353 (2001), held its 5475th meeting in private with the troop-contributing countries to the United Nations Operation in Burundi.

The Security Council and the troop-contributing countries heard a briefing under rule 39 of its provisional rules of procedure by Nureldin Satti, Acting Special Representative of the Secretary-General for Burundi.

Members of the Council, Mr. Satti and representatives of participating troop-contributing countries had a constructive exchange of views.

The Security Council resumed its consideration of the item at its 5476th meeting, held on 28 June 2006 in accordance with the understanding reached in its prior consultations.

The President, with the consent of the Council, invited the representatives of Austria, Canada, Colombia, Guatemala, Iraq, Liechtenstein, Slovenia and Uganda, at their request, to participate in the consideration of the item without the right to vote.

In accordance with the understanding reached in the Council's prior consultations, the President, with the consent of the Council, extended an invitation under rule 39 of the Council's provisional rules of procedure to Jan Egeland, Under-Secretary-General for Humanitarian Affairs and Emergency Relief Coordinator.

The Security Council resumed its consideration of the item at its 5477th meeting, held on 29 June 2006 in accordance with the understanding reached in its prior consultations.

The President, with the consent of the Council, invited the representative of Iraq, at his request, to participate in the consideration of the item without the right to vote.

The President stated that, following consultations of the Council, she had been authorized to make a statement on behalf of the Council and read out the text of that statement (for the text, see S/PRST/2006/29; to be issued in *Official Records of the Security Council, Resolutions and Decisions of the Security Council, 1 August 2005-31 July 2006*).

The Security Council resumed its consideration of the item at its 5478th meeting, held on 29 June 2006 in accordance with the understanding reached in its prior consultations, having before it the report of the Security Council mission to the Sudan and Chad (S/2006/433).

The President, with the consent of the Council, invited the representatives of Austria, Chad, Egypt, Norway and the Sudan, at their request, to participate in the consideration of the item without the right to vote.

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The situation in Burundi (*see* S/25070/Add.43 and 46; S/1994/20/Add.29, 33, 41 and 50; S/1995/40/Add.4, 9, 12 and 34; S/1996/15 and Add.4, 9, 16, 19, 29, 30 and 34; S/1997/40/Add.21; S/1999/25/Add.44; S/2000/40/Add.2 and 38; S/2001/15/Add.9, 11, 26, 38, 39 and 44-46; S/2002/30/Add.5, 37, 48 and 50; S/2003/40/Add.17, 38, 48 and 51; S/2004/20/Add.20, 33, 38 and 48; S/2005/15/Add.10, 20, 21, 23, 24, 34, 37, 47 and 50; and S/2006/10/Add.11)

The Security Council resumed its consideration of the item at its 5479th meeting, held on 30 June 2006 in accordance with the understanding reached in its prior consultations, having before it the seventh report of the Secretary-General on the United Nations Operation in Burundi (S/2006/429).

The President, with the consent of the Council, invited the representative of Burundi, at his request, to participate in the consideration of the item without the right to vote.

The President drew attention to a draft resolution (S/2006/456) that had been prepared in the course of the Council's prior consultations.

The Security Council proceeded to vote on draft resolution S/2006/456, and adopted it unanimously as resolution 1692 (2006) (for the text, see S/RES/1692 (2006); to be issued in *Official Records of the Security Council, Resolutions and Decisions of the Security Council, 1 August 2005-31 July 2006*).

The situation concerning the Democratic Republic of the Congo (*see* S/1997/40/Add.21; S/1998/44/Add.35 and 49; S/1999/25/Add.10, 13, 24, 30, 43, 47 and 49; S/2000/40/Add.3, 7, 16, 17, 19, 21, 23, 30, 33, 40, 47 and 49; S/2001/15/Add.5, 8, 18, 24, 30, 35, 36, 43, 45, 50 and 51; S/2002/30/Add.4, 8, 11, 20, 22, 23, 29, 31, 32, 36, 41, 42, 44 and 48; S/2003/40/Add.3, 6, 11, 19, 21, 25, 27, 28, 30, 32, 34 and 46; S/2004/20/Add.2, 10, 19, 23, 25, 30, 39 and 49; S/2005/15/Add.8, 12, 14, 15, 25, 27, 29, 35, 38, 39, 42 and 50; and S/2006/10/Add.3, 4, 14 and 16)

The Security Council resumed its consideration of the item at its 5480th meeting, held on 30 June 2006 in accordance with the understanding reached in its prior consultations, having before it the twenty-first report of the Secretary-General on the United Nations Organization Mission in the Democratic Republic of the Congo (S/2006/390).

The President, with the consent of the Council, invited the representative of the Democratic Republic of the Congo, at his request, to participate in the consideration of the item without the right to vote.

The President drew attention to a draft resolution (S/2006/457) that had been prepared in the course of the Council's prior consultations.

The Security Council proceeded to vote on draft resolution S/2006/457, and adopted it unanimously as resolution 1693 (2006) (for the text, see S/RES/1693 (2006); to be issued in *Official Records of the Security Council, Resolutions and Decisions of the Security Council, 1 August 2005-31 July 2006*).

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The situation in the Middle East, including the Palestinian question (see S/2000/40/Add.39, 44, 46, 47 and 50; S/2001/15/Add.11-13, 34 and 50; S/2002/30/Add.7, 8, 10, 12-15, 17, 23, 24, 28, 29, 37, 38, 45 and 50; S/2003/40/Add.2, 6, 11, 15, 20, 23, 28, 33, 37, 41, 42, 46 and 49; S/2004/20/Add.2, 7, 11, 12, 16, 20, 25, 28, 32, 37, 40, 42, 46 and 50; S/2005/15/Add.1, 6, 7, 9, 11, 15, 19, 23, 28, 33, 37, 41, 47 and 50; and S/2006/10/Add.4, 8, 12, 15, 16, 20 and 24)

By a letter dated 29 June 2006 addressed to the President of the Security Council (S/2006/458), the Permanent Representative of Algeria to the United Nations, in his capacity as Chairman of the Group of Arab States for the month of June 2006, and on behalf of the States members of the League of Arab States, requested that an immediate meeting of the Security Council be convened "to consider the practices of Israel, the occupying Power, affecting Palestinian civilians in the Occupied Palestinian Territory, including East Jerusalem".

By a letter dated 29 June 2006 addressed to the President of the Security Council (S/2006/462), the Permanent Representative of Qatar to the United Nations requested that an immediate meeting of the Security Council be convened to consider the item entitled "The situation in the Middle East, including the Palestinian question".

The Security Council resumed its consideration of the item at its 5481st meeting, held on 30 June 2006, in response to those requests.

The President, with the consent of the Council, invited the representatives of Algeria, Austria, Cuba, Egypt, India, Indonesia, the Islamic Republic of Iran, Israel, Jordan, Lebanon, the Libyan Arab Jamahiriya, Malaysia, Morocco, Norway, South Africa, the Syrian Arab Republic, Yemen and Zimbabwe, at their request, to participate in the consideration of the item without the right to vote.

In response to the request contained in a letter dated 30 June 2006 from the Permanent Observer of Palestine to the United Nations addressed to the President of the Security Council (S/2006/465), the President, in accordance with the rules of procedure and the previous practice in that regard, invited the Permanent Observer of Palestine to participate in the discussion.

In response to the request contained in a letter dated 30 June 2006 from the Permanent Representative of Senegal to the United Nations, the President extended an invitation under rule 39 of the Council's provisional rules of procedure to Paul Badji, Chairman of the Committee on the Exercise of the Inalienable Rights of the Palestinian People.

In accordance with the understanding reached in the Council's prior consultations, the President, with the consent of the Council, extended an invitation under rule 39 of the Council's provisional rules of procedure to Angela Kane, Assistant Secretary-General for Political Affairs.

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
