

Letter dated 19 January 2006 from the Secretary-General of the Council of the European Union addressed to the Secretary-General of the United Nations

Three years ago, the European Union launched its Police Mission to Bosnia and Herzegovina as a follow-on to the International Police Task Force. This was welcomed by the Security Council, notably in the statement of the President of the Security Council of 12 December 2002 (S/PRST/2002/33). The Council expressed its intention to keep the implementation of the Peace Agreement, and the situation in Bosnia and Herzegovina under review and invited the European Union to keep it regularly informed, as appropriate, on the activities of the European Union Police Mission.

I am happy to say that, up to now, the European Union Police Mission in Bosnia and Herzegovina has made considerable advances in developing sustainable policing arrangements under the ownership of Bosnia and Herzegovina. Some of the achievements of the Mission to date include:

- The State Investigation and Protection Agency, which is being transformed into an operational police agency with enhanced and executive powers to fight major and organized crime, is now starting to find its feet as an institution;
- Solid development of other State-level institutions, in cooperation with the European Commission, including, notably, the Ministry of Security and the State Border Service.

Coherence and coordination will be ensured with other international actors in Bosnia and Herzegovina and the region. The European Union Special Representative will have a leading role in ensuring coordination in Bosnia and Herzegovina.

The follow-on mission was launched on 1 January 2006. It will have a duration of two years. The European Union Police Mission will include approximately 170 police officers, mainly seconded from member States of the European Union. Brigadier-General Vincenzo Coppola (Italy) has been appointed as Head of Mission.

As requested by the Security Council at the launch of the European Union Police Mission in 2002, we will continue to keep the Security Council updated on the progress of the new phase of the Mission.
