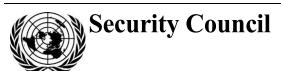

Recommendations of the Analytical Support and Sanctions Monitoring Team contained in its thirty-third report (\$\frac{8}{2024}/92)\$

- 1. On 28 December 2023, the thirty-third report of the Analytical Support and Sanctions Monitoring Team was submitted to the Committee pursuant to paragraph (a) of annex I to Security Council resolution 2610 (2021). A table of recommendations based on the report was also circulated to the Committee on 2 January 2024, and the Committee deliberated on the table of recommendations on 22 January 2024. The Committee would like to express its gratitude to the Monitoring Team for the exemplary work undertaken in the fulfilment of its mandate.
- 2. Since December 2005, when it established the practice, the Committee has responded to each of the reports submitted by the Monitoring Team and has brought to the attention of the Security Council and the public the Committee's position on the recommendations contained in those reports.

Recommendation Paragraph Position of the Committee

Sanctions list

- 1. The Monitoring Team continues to stress the importance of Member States sharing additional information to update list entries and narrative summaries without delay in accordance with their national legislation, and in support of annual review and data validation processes (\$\sqrt{2023}/549\$, para. 107).
- 2. The Monitoring Team proposes that the Committee mandate the Team, working together with the Secretariat and other sanctions committees' panels of experts if required, to study and assess the scope to update the standard form for the listing of individuals and entities under the ISIL (Da'esh) and Al-Qaida regime, and to consider what tools might support more effective list management. The Team should report its findings back to the Committee in due course for further consideration by the Committee.
- 121 The Committee agreed to write to Member States to stress the importance of Member States sharing additional information to update list entries and narrative summaries without delay in accordance with their national legislation, and in support of annual review and data validation processes.
- Team, working together with the Secretariat and other sanctions committees' panels of experts if required and on a case-by-case basis, to study and assess the scope to update the standard form for the listing of individuals and entities under the ISIL (Da'esh) and Al-Qaida regime, and to consider what tools might support more effective list management. The Team should report its findings back to the Committee in due course for further consideration by the Committee. Any further discussions as well as potential changes should be subject to consideration by the Committee and its approval by consensus.
