Reports of the Secretary-General on the Sudan

Report of the Secretary-General on the United Nations Mission in the Sudan (S/2010/168 and Add.1)

The President: The Security Council will now begin its consideration of the item on its agenda. The Council is meeting in accordance with the understanding reached in its prior consultations.

Members of the Council have before them document S/2010/215, which contains the text of a draft resolution submitted by the United States of America.

I should like to draw the attention of members to document S/2010/168 and Add.1, which contains the report of the Secretary-General on the United Nations Mission in the Sudan.

It is my understanding that the Council is ready to proceed to the vote on the draft resolution before it. If I hear no objection, I shall put the draft resolution to the vote now.

There being no objection, it is so decided.

A vote was taken by show of hands.

In favour:

Austria, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Brazil, China, France, Gabon, Japan, Lebanon, Mexico, Nigeria, Russian Federation, Turkey, Uganda, United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland, United States of America.

The President: There were 15 votes in favour. The draft resolution has been adopted unanimously as resolution 1919 (2010).

The Security Council has thus concluded the present stage of the item on the agenda.
