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### **Report of the Special Committee on the Charter of the United Nations and on the Strengthening of the Role of the Organization**

## ***Repertory of Practice of United Nations Organs and Repertoire of the Practice of the Security Council***

### **Report of the Secretary-General**

#### *Summary*

In conformity with General Assembly resolution [76/115](#), the present report provides an outline of the progress made by the Secretariat between 1 July 2021 and 30 June 2022 in updating the *Repertory of Practice of United Nations Organs* and the *Repertoire of the Practice of the Security Council*. The Assembly is invited to take action in the light of the conclusions drawn in paragraphs 17 and 30.

## I. Introduction

1. The present report has been prepared pursuant to General Assembly resolution [76/115](#). It provides information on the progress made by the Secretariat between 1 July 2021 and 30 June 2022<sup>1</sup> in updating the *Repertory of Practice of United Nations Organs* and the *Repertoire of the Practice of the Security Council*. It examines the respective mandates and workflow in the preparation of these publications, in printed and electronic forms, and gives an overview of the available resources and existing modalities of cooperation with academic institutions, associate experts, temporary staff and consultants, as appropriate. The Assembly is invited to take action in the light of the conclusions drawn in paragraphs 17 and 30.

## II. *Repertory of Practice of United Nations Organs*

### A. Mandate and preparation of supplements to the *Repertory*

2. The *Repertory of Practice of United Nations Organs* was originally mandated by the General Assembly in its resolution [796 \(VIII\)](#) of 27 November 1953. Its purpose is to document the Organization's application and interpretation of each individual Article of the Charter of the United Nations, to form a legislative history contributing to the knowledge and understanding of the Charter as applied in the practice of the organs of the United Nations.

3. Bearing in mind the call made upon the Secretary-General, in paragraph 17 of General Assembly resolution [76/115](#), to address, effectively and on a priority basis, the backlog in the preparation of all volumes of the *Repertory*, in particular volume III, the Codification Division of the Office of Legal Affairs, acting as coordinator for the preparation of the *Repertory*, maintained regular contact with the Faculty of Law at the University of Ottawa and Korea University.

4. With regard to Supplement No. 10 (2000–2009), Korea University has completed its research and is continuing the drafting of its studies on Articles 43 to 47 of the Charter for volume III.

5. Progress has also been made in relation to Supplement No. 11 (2010–2015), whereby a study on Article 11 for volume II, previously prepared with the assistance of the Faculty of Law at the University of Ottawa, has been reviewed and finalized by its author department, the Office for Disarmament Affairs. In addition, a study on Article 58 for volume IV, prepared by a consultant and financed in 2020/21 from the trust fund for the elimination of the backlog in the *Repertory of Practice of United Nations Organs*, was reviewed and finalized by the author department, the Department of Economic and Social Affairs. Both studies have been posted on the *Repertory* website. Furthermore, research on and the drafting of two studies, one on Article 19 and one on Article 103, have been entrusted to two consultants, to be financed in 2022/23 from the same trust fund, and a study on Articles 104 and 105 remains under review by the Office of the Legal Counsel in the Office of Legal Affairs.

6. With regard to Supplement No. 12 (2016–2020), owing to the continued assistance of the Faculty of Law at the University of Ottawa, research and drafting were completed in relation to 13 studies, as follows: studies on Articles 2 (4) and (7) for volume I; studies on Articles 12 and 14 for volume II; studies on Articles 27, 34, 35, 39, 41, 50, 52 and 53 for volume III and a study on Article 96 for volume VI. Research on and the drafting of two studies, one on Article 13 (1) (a) (second part of

the sentence) and one on Article 103, have been entrusted to two consultants, to be financed in 2022/23 from the trust fund for the elimination of the backlog in the *Repertory*.

7. As is customary, the Department of Global Communications and the Dag Hammarskjöld Library played an important role in supporting the research phase for the *Repertory* studies.

8. Furthermore, during the period under review, the Department for General Assembly and Conference Management published one volume in electronic format: volume IV in English and Spanish for Supplement No. 9 (1995–1999). All studies included in the volume were accordingly posted on the *Repertory* website. The current status of the publication is thus as follows: 38 volumes have been published,<sup>2</sup> and 6 have been finalized and submitted for translation and editing.<sup>3</sup> Consequently, from among the 63 volumes of which the publication as a whole (original *Repertory* and Supplements Nos. 1 to 12 thereto) should consist, as at 30 June 2022, work remains to be completed on 19 volumes, 4 of which pertain to Supplement No. 10, 6 to Supplement No. 11 and 6 to Supplement No. 12, which are all at different stages of preparation (see paras. 4–6 above). The other three volumes on which work remains to be completed correspond to volume III of Supplements Nos. 7 (1985–1988) and 8 (1989–1994) and Supplement No. 9.

9. Annex I to the present report contains a list of which Secretariat units are responsible for preparing *Repertory* studies on each of the individual Articles of the Charter. Annex II provides information on the status of the *Repertory*.

## **B. Availability of *Repertory* studies on the *Repertory* website**

10. Studies from 44 complete volumes, including the 6 volumes at the translation and editing stages, are available on the United Nations website for the *Repertory* (<http://legal.un.org/repertory>). Advance versions of several studies on individual Articles for volume III of Supplements Nos. 7 to 9, as well as a large number of studies for Supplement No. 10 that have been finalized and are awaiting the completion of the respective volumes, continue to be made accessible on the website. This is also done for completed studies for Supplement No. 11. The electronic version of the *Repertory* includes a full-text search feature, providing users with the opportunity to search all the studies instantaneously for any word or combination of words in the three languages of the publication (English, French and Spanish).

11. Currently, all studies available in English are on the *Repertory* website, and most of them are also available in French and Spanish, while a few are available in only one of these languages. Finalized studies awaiting translation and editing are placed on the *Repertory* website in the language in which they have been prepared (English for most of them and French for some of them). The Secretariat will continue to make available electronically all three language versions of the finalized *Repertory* studies.

### **C. Cooperation with academic institutions and sponsoring of associate experts**

12. The well-established cooperation with the Faculty of Law at the University of Ottawa continued for the twelfth consecutive year. During the period under review, the Faculty of Law contributed to the preparation of 13 studies (see para. 6 above). Cooperation with Korea University also continued.

13. With a view to revitalizing cooperation with academic institutions and pursuing a diverse geographical spread, the Codification Division, acting as coordinator for the preparation of the *Repertory*, continued to call upon permanent missions to the United Nations to identify academic institutions that may be interested in contributing to the preparation of studies. In the past five years, the Codification Division has had preliminary contact with four universities: two in the South Pacific region, one in the Latin American and Caribbean region and one in the Western European and other States region. The Codification Division continued to invite academic institutions to which members of the International Law Commission are affiliated to consider contributing to the preparation of studies.

14. Furthermore, consistent with paragraph 15 of resolution [76/115](#), in which the General Assembly reiterated its call for the sponsoring, on a voluntary basis and with no cost to the United Nations, of associate experts to assist in the updating of the *Repertory*, the Codification Division made an appeal to all permanent missions to the United Nations by a note verbale dated 10 January 2022. As at 30 June 2022, the appeal had led to preliminary contacts with representatives of the Asia-Pacific region and the Latin American and Caribbean region.

### **D. Trust fund**

15. In its resolution [76/115](#), the General Assembly reiterated its call for voluntary contributions to the trust fund established pursuant to its resolution [59/44](#), in order to eliminate the backlog in the *Repertory*. Accordingly, a note verbale was sent on 10 January 2022 to all permanent missions to the United Nations, reminding them of the possibility of making voluntary contributions to the trust fund and inviting them to bring the question of funding for the *Repertory* to the attention of private institutions and individuals that might wish to assist in that regard. The Secretary-General welcomes with appreciation the contribution to the trust fund received during the period under review (1 July 2021 to 30 June 2022) from the Philippines, in the amount of \$5,000. The fund balance as at 30 June 2022 was \$95,285.

16. During the period under review, a total of three consultants, to be financed through the trust fund, were recruited to research and draft studies on Article 19 for Supplement No. 11, Article 103 for Supplements Nos. 11 and 12, and Article 13.1 (a) (second part of the sentence) for Supplement No. 12 (see paras. 5–6). The further use of consultants for the preparation of studies pertaining to volumes that are nearing completion is envisaged. Additional contributions to the trust fund are therefore strongly encouraged, so as to allow the Secretariat to continue to eliminate the backlog in the *Repertory*.

## E. Action for the consideration of the General Assembly

17. With regard to the *Repertory*, in the light of the foregoing, the General Assembly may wish:

(a) To further encourage Member States to identify academic institutions that have the capacity to contribute to the preparation of studies for the *Repertory* and to provide the contact details of such institutions, and in this regard further welcome the initiative of the Secretariat also to invite members of the International Law Commission to recommend academic institutions that the Secretariat could contact for this purpose;

(b) To note with appreciation the contributions made by Member States to the trust fund for the elimination of the backlog in the *Repertory*;

(c) To reiterate its call for voluntary contributions to the trust fund for the elimination of the backlog in the *Repertory*, so as to further support the Secretariat in carrying out the effective elimination of that backlog, and the sponsoring, on a voluntary basis and with no cost to the United Nations, of associate experts to assist in the updating of the publication;

(d) To call upon the Secretary-General to continue his efforts towards updating the publication and making it available electronically in all its language versions (English, French and Spanish), and encourage the continued updating of the website for the *Repertory*;

(e) To note with concern that the backlog in the preparation of all volumes of the *Repertory*, in particular volume III, although slightly reduced, has not been eliminated, and call upon the Secretary-General to address that issue effectively and on a priority basis, while commending the Secretary-General for progress made in reducing the backlog.

## III. *Repertoire of the Practice of the Security Council*

### A. Mandate and preparation

18. The *Repertoire of the Practice of the Security Council*, originally mandated by the General Assembly in its resolution 686 (VII) of 5 December 1952, provides a record of the evolving practice and procedure of the Council in the framework of the Charter of the United Nations and the provisional rules of procedure of the Security Council. Most recently, in its resolution 76/115, the Assembly called upon the Secretary-General to continue to follow the modalities outlined in paragraphs 102 to 106 of his report dated 18 September 1952 (A/2170).

19. In paragraph 12 of resolution 76/115, the General Assembly commended the Secretary-General for the progress made towards updating the *Repertoire*. In paragraph 16, the Assembly called upon the Secretary-General to continue his efforts towards updating the *Repertoire* and making it available electronically in all its language versions.

20. During the reporting period, pursuant to the mandate provided by the General Assembly, the Secretariat continued to make significant progress in the preparation of the Supplements to the *Repertoire*. The focus of the work of the Secretariat over the past year was the preparation of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth Supplements to the *Repertoire*, covering the years 2020 and 2021, respectively.

21. The Secretariat completed the twenty-third Supplement to the *Repertoire* in October 2021. The advance version of the Supplement has been posted on the website

of the Security Council, while the published version is expected to be made available online and in hard copy in the third quarter of 2022. The individual parts of the twenty-fourth Supplement will be posted online in their advance version as they are completed. The entire advance version of the twenty-fourth Supplement is on schedule to be made available online by October 2022, as newly elected members of the Council commence observing its proceedings. In line with the methodology for contemporary coverage of the practice of the Council, the Secretariat has commenced research and drafting work for the twenty-fifth Supplement, covering the year 2022.

22. The aim of this schedule for the preparation of the *Repertoire* is to ensure that the invaluable information on the practice of the Security Council is made available to States Members of the United Nations and the public as soon as possible. In order to ensure the sustainability of the contemporary approach to the coverage of the practice of the Council, the Secretariat continued to optimize the limited resources available through efficiency-enhancing initiatives, such as the development of new technologies. During the period under review, using extrabudgetary resources and in line with the Secretary-General's strategy on new technologies, the Secretariat advanced the development of a new web-enabled database, which would significantly expedite and facilitate the research and drafting of the *Repertoire*. Those efforts have also been aided by the recruitment and training of additional staff and the increased use of the internship and United Nations Volunteers programmes. The various offices within the Secretariat that are responsible for the complex tasks of editing, translating, indexing and publishing the *Repertoire* made progress on further enhancing coordination and ensuring the most efficient division of labour.

## **B. Availability of *Repertoire* studies on the Security Council website**

23. The Secretariat continued to make available advance and published versions of the Supplements to the *Repertoire* on the website ([www.un.org/securitycouncil/content/repertoire/structure](http://www.un.org/securitycouncil/content/repertoire/structure)) of the Security Council immediately upon their completion. The Supplements are searchable and systematized both chronologically and by topic. Moreover, the accessibility of the *Repertoire* online has been improved through the launch of a new and more user-friendly website layout and a more comprehensive and accurate search engine.

24. In the past year, in line with the Data Strategy of the Secretary-General for Action by Everyone, Everywhere, the Secretariat continued to expand and improve the use of technology to present various aspects of the practice of the Security Council on the website in an engaging and accessible manner. The existing data sets on children and armed conflict, on the protection of civilians and on women and peace and security were expanded to include information dating back to the inception of those items in 1999 and 2000.

25. In line with established practice, the *Highlights of Security Council Practice* covering 2021 was published in early January 2022. The publication continues to provide a comprehensive overview of trends relating to Council meetings and informal engagements, its agenda, the decision-making process and voting patterns, as well as the work of its subsidiary organs. In the 2021 edition features new areas of analysis, such as a greater focus on Arria-formula meetings and on informal interactive dialogues, as well as joint thematic priorities and actions of members of the Council on such issues as women and peace and security. The Secretariat also launched an informal monthly newsletter entitled "UN Security Council in Review", which provides an overview of the activity of the Council each month and has a dedicated page on the website of the Council, where the broader public can subscribe to it. Several data sets of the Security Council Practices and Charter Research Branch were also made available on the Peace and Security Data Hub, a free public library

on peace and security that was launched jointly by the Department of Political and Peacebuilding Affairs and the Department of Peace Operations and that features data sets from across the United Nations system. Given the value of the information tools on the practice of the Council for Member States and the public at large, the Secretariat strengthened its promotional activities and actively leveraged social media to increase awareness and enhance knowledge about, and improve the quality of data on, the Council.

26. The Secretariat continued to fulfil and enhance its advisory role through the provision of information in response to questions relating to the procedural and constitutional practice of the Security Council and its subsidiary organs. During the reporting period, the Secretariat received a substantial number of such queries from Member States, officials of the United Nations system and representatives of other international organizations, non-governmental organizations, academic institutions, scholars, researchers and the private sector. In addition, the Secretariat provided in-depth research and analysis for internal policy development and engaged in several outreach programmes aimed at familiarizing new Council members with the evolving procedure, practice and working methods of the Council, including the latest developments with respect to the working methods developed by the Council during the COVID-19 pandemic.

### **C. Publication in language versions (print and electronic)**

27. Pursuant to General Assembly resolution [55/222](#), the published versions of the eleventh to the twenty-second Supplements to the *Repertoire*, covering the period from 1989 to 2019, have been made available online in all six official languages. Using additional editorial capacity funded through extrabudgetary resources, the Secretariat has successfully maintained the 22-month schedule, from the closing of the reporting period to the publication of the final version of each Supplement in English, thereby also expediting publication in the other five official languages. The twenty-second Supplement, covering the year 2019, was published in English in October 2021 and in the other five languages in April 2022. The twenty-third Supplement, covering the year 2020, is expected to be published in English by September 2022 and in the other five official languages in the spring of 2023. Going forward, the aim of the Secretariat would be to reduce even further the time between the end of the reporting period and the publication of the corresponding Supplement in all official languages.

### **D. Resources**

28. The progress made in the preparation and publication of the *Repertoire* and the maintenance of its website in all official languages would not have been possible without the continuing support of Member States. Voluntary contributions to the trust fund for the updating of the *Repertoire of the Practice of the Security Council* remained a critical element for sustaining the progress made to date and for improving accessibility to information on the practice of the Security Council. During the reporting period, the Secretariat launched a new appeal for funding to replenish the trust fund, so as to maintain a predictable publication schedule for the *Repertoire*, prevent the creation of a backlog and strengthen the infrastructure for data collection, analysis and visualization.

29. Extrabudgetary resources have enabled the Secretariat to retain the services of temporary staff and a United Nations Volunteer to assist in the preparation of the *Repertoire*. Since the previous report, contributions to the trust fund have been

received from China, Estonia, France, India, Ireland, Portugal and the United Arab Emirates. In addition, Japan and Sweden have sponsored associate experts in the Security Council Practices and Charter Research Branch, who have made substantial contributions to advancing work on the *Repertoire*. In order to sustain the progress achieved to date, the Secretary-General calls upon Member States to further support the work of the Secretariat in updating the *Repertoire* through voluntary contributions to the trust fund and the sponsoring of associate experts.

#### **E. Action for the consideration of the General Assembly**

30. **With respect to the *Repertoire of the Practice of the Security Council*, in the light of the foregoing, the General Assembly may wish:**

(a) **To note with appreciation the contributions made by Member States to the trust fund for the updating of the *Repertoire*;**

(b) **To reiterate its call for voluntary contributions to the trust fund for the updating of the *Repertoire* and the sponsoring, on a voluntary basis and with no cost to the United Nations, of associate experts to assist in the updating of the publication;**

(c) **To call upon the Secretary-General to continue his efforts towards updating the publication and making it available electronically in all its language versions;**

(d) **To reiterate the responsibility of the Secretary-General for the quality of the *Repertoire*, and to call upon the Secretary-General to continue to follow the modalities outlined in paragraphs 102 to 106 of his report dated 18 September 1952 ([A/2170](#)).**
