LETTER DATED 15 AUGUST 1991 FROM THE PERMANENT REPRESENTATIVE OF KUWAIT TO THE UNITED NATIONS ADDRESSED TO THE PRESIDENT OF

THE SECURITY COUNCIL

On inatructiona from my Government, I wish to inform you of the details of a serious incident which occurred on Wednesday, 14 August 1991 when a Kuwaiti group led by the Kuwaiti Vice-Minister for the Interior was going to inspect the frontier post in the Kuwaiti demilitarised zone with the knowledge of the United Nations Iraq-Kuwait Observation Mission (UNIKOM). The Kuwaiti group was accompanied by Captain Paul Wink and Captain Phillip Point of UNIKOM.

While the group was making for the Sugaihid frontier post, one of the UNIKOM vehicles became immobiliaed as a result of tho rough road and the Kuwaiti group was obliged to leave two vehicles in order to assist the broken-down vehicle. Shortly afterwards, the immobilised group was surprised by a red 1990 Chevrolet carrying about eight Iraqi soldiers commanded by an Iraqi first lieutenant, They opened fire on the Kuwait1 group which was therefore obliged to return the fire and to rescue the individuals in the brokon-down vehicle and set off to rejoin the remaindor of the Kuwaiti group and report the incident to Captain Wink and Captain Point. A UNIKOM vehicle sot out immediately for the scone of the incident, accompanied by a colonel and a Kuwaiti officer, and arrived at the same time as an Observation Mission helicopter. The observers wore surpri od to find that the Iraqi Army personnel had increased to full company strength and were attempting to take possession of the disabled Kuwaiti vehicle by force, As the Iraqi soldiers refused to withdraw to the frontier, the UNIKOM personnel were obliged to arque with them, warning them that they had committed serious violations of the Kuwaiti border (carriage of arms, thoft and crossing the border to a distance of 2 kilometres) and that they must withdraw immediately. The members of the Observation Mission than towed the disabled Kuwaiti vehicle to the UNIKOM position,

This incident is a flagrant violation of the cease-fire arrangements between Kuwait and Iraq and an example of the intentions of Iraq and of its lack of respect for its commitments, to the detriment of security and stability in the region. After this incident, in which members of the United Nations Observation Mission took part and saw what happened, the Iraqi

authoritier will not be able, as they are roourtomed to do, to wade their responsibility for the incident since it occurred within sight and earshot of thr Mission. The Security Council is therefore requested to warn Iraq against any repetition of ouch grave violation8 and to hold it responsible for the full consequences of any recurrence.

I should be grateful if you would have the text of this letter circulated as a document of the Security Council.
